May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Ministers' and Elders of the Synod of Presbyterians in Ireland, distinguished by the name Seceders, humbly entreat your Royal Highness's permission to lay before the throne of our venerable Sovereign renewed assurances of continued loyalty

The many virtues that adorned His Majesty's private life, cannot but have endeared him to every lover of virtue and religion, and the mild, but steady and unshaken firmness, with which, through a long reign, he has maintained and directed the principles of our hap y Constitution, cannot but command the veneration of all, who, with us, regard them with pride and with jealousy, as our great security for civil liberty, and as wearing the most benign aspect towards that religion which we

regard still more.
With these objects before dur eyes, and strongly

impressing our hearts, our sympathy in His Ma-jesty's affliction is sincere, and deep felt. In your Royal Highness we recognise, with great pleasure, the same princelly littues, the same wis-dom of counsel, the same tender solicitude for the happiness of His Majesty's people, and the same zeal to preserve their civil liberties, and to promote their religious and moral improvement, that engaged the willing and cheerful subjection of our ancestors and of us.

The necessity of war we deeply deplore; but seeing an enemy has been permitted to rise up against the common liberties of Europe, insatiable in his lust of dominion, unprincipled in his mode of warfare, and possessed of the means of hostility to an unusual extent, and seeing his most inveterate ani-mosity is directed against. The liberty, tranquillity, and prosperity of the British dominions, we feel the justice of the contest in which His Majesty's arms are employed; and can with confidence appeal to the God of Armies, that he would direct the councils of the nation, go forth with our armies, and bring the rurposes of our enemies to nought.
