By virtue of the authority in me vested, and in conformity with an ordinance of the 23d May, and an edict of the 24th August 1800; I, do hereby make known, that, in compliance with a petition delivered in, I have permitted and granted that the Honourable Dealing Court for the jurisdiction of Christiansted, in this island, administering the dealing of Peter Totten, may summon by proclama sub pena proeluct et perpetui silenti, all she known or unknown Creditors to the said Peter Totten, residing in European or American territories, to come forward with their demands; and to enter and prove their claims in person or by their attorneys, before the said Dealing Court, previous to the expiration of the period hereinafter limited; that is to say within one year and six weeks following the period when this proclamation shall have been recorded in the Superior and Inferior Courts of the islands of Santa Cruz, St. Thomas, and St. John, and published three times successively in the London Gazette; and all such known or unknown Creditors as reside in any of the West India islands or colonies, shall come forward with their demands, and enter and prove their claims in person or by their attorneys, before the said Dealing Court, within three months from the date of this proclamation being recorded in the Superior and Inferior Courts of the islands of Santa Cruz, St. Thomas, and St. John, and notice thereof being published in the Santa Cruz Gazette three times successively. And the aforesaid Dealing Court shall further be bound to call this grant to be produced in the Royal and the London Commissioners Book-keepers Office, to the said islands, and procure a certificate of this being compiled with; in failure of which, this proclamation shall not be valid against any claims or pretensions of His Majesty; and all persons concerned are to take notice hereof, and to conduct themselves accordingly.
