accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Floating Light at the Entrance of the Harbour of Liverpool, established by Authority of Parliament.

THE Trustees of the Liverpool Docks give notice, that a Floating Light is preparing to be moored at the North West Spit of East Hoylo Sand Bank, in the entrance into the port of Liverpool; its bearings will be by compass. The present N. W. Buoy, S. E. one mile distant; the Daid Marks on Hilbre Island in one, bearing S. E. five miles distant.—The Mockbeggar and Helston Lights a little open to the Southward bearing S. E. 1 E 5. The Light will be Red, to distinguish it from all the lights upon the shore, and will be exhibited in a lantern hoisted at the mainmast-head of the vessel, and will be lighted for the first time on Wednesday the 1st December next, and will continue to be lit in future from sunset to sunrise.
