“ Those of the Lieutenant-Governor of the Royal Hospital at Greenwich; of the Lieutenant-Governor of the Royal Naval College; and of the Governor of the Royal Naval Asylum, to contain an anchor without a crown, with a wreath of laurel:—

“ Those of the Governors of the Royal Naval Hospitals to be similar to the buttons directed by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 19th September 1810, to be worn by the Commissioners of the Transport Service.”—Of which publication was made in the London Gazette on Saturday September 22, 1812.

RULES and Regulations for granting Licences by the Commissioners for the Affairs of India, under the authority of the 12th section of an Act (53 G. 3. c. 155.) passed in the 53d year of His Majesty's reign, intituled “ An Act for continuing “ in the East India Company, for a further term, “ the possession of the British territories in India; “ together with certain exclusive privileges; for “ establishing further regulations for the government of the said territories, and the better administration of justice within the same; and for “ regulating the trade to and from the places “ within the limits of the said Company's charter.”

Licences will be granted by this Board for any vessel navigated according to law, to proceed under the provisions of the said Act of the 53d Geo. 3. cap. 155, and also of the Acts 54 Geo. 3. cap. 34 (1) and 36 (2), to any ports or places situate more to the northward than eleven degrees of south latitude, and between the sixty-fourth and one hundred and fiftieth degrees of east longitude from London, save and except ports and places upon the Continent of Asia, from the River Indus to the Town of Malacca, inclusive, or in any island under the Government of the East India Company, lying to the North of the Equator, and also save and except the East India Company's Factory at Bencoolen and its dependencies.

Every application for a licence must specify the name, built, and measurement of the vessel for which it is required, the port to which she belongs, and the name of the Owners and Master.
