A PROCLAMATION,

Declaring the Cessation of Arms as well by Sea as Land, agreed upon between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty, and enjoining the Observance thereof.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS a Convention for the suspension of hostilities between His Majesty and the kingdom of France, was signed at Paris on the twenty-third day of April last, by the Plenipotentiary of His Majesty and the Plenipotentiary of His Royal Highness Monsieur, brother of the Most Christian King, Lieutenant-General of the Kingdom of France: And whereas, for the putting an end to the calamities of war, as soon, and as far as may be possible, it hath been agreed between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty as follows; that is to say, that as soon as the Convention shall be signed and ratified, friendship should be established between His Majesty and the kingdom of France by sea and land, in all parts of the world: and in order to prevent all causes of complaint and dispute which might arise with respect to prizes that might be made at sea after the signature of the said Convention, it has also been reciprocally agreed, that the vessels and effects which might be taken in the English Channel and in the North Seas, after the space of twelve days, to be reckoned from the exchange of the ratifications of the said Convention, should be restored on both sides; that the term

should be one month within the British Channel and North Seas to the Canary Islands, and to the Equator; and five months in every other part of the world, without any exception, or other particular distinction of time or of place. And whereas the ratifications of the said Convention were exchanged by the respective Plenipotentiaries above-mentioned, on the third day of this instant May, from which day the several terms above-mentioned, of twelve days, of one month, and five months, are to be computed: Now, in order that the several epochs fixed as aforesaid between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty should be generally known and observed; We have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to notify the same to His Majesty's loving subjects; and We do hereby, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, strictly charge and command all His Majesty's Officers both at sea and land, and all other His Majesty's subjects whatsoever, that they forbear all acts of hostility, either by sea or land, against the kingdom of France, her Allies, her vassals or subjects, under the penalty of incurring His Majesty's highest displeasure.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the sixth day of May, in the fifty-fourth year of His Majesty's reign, and in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fourteen.

We have to express our grateful sense of that persevering firmness and judicious moderation which have distinguished His Majesty's councils.

Our armies in the Peninsula, during a long and arduous campaign, will stand foremost in the page of history for discipline, prudence, and matchless courage, whilst the British Navy has for a long series of years been the admiration of the world.

The faithful and liberal policy of His Majesty's councils has been nobly combined with the skilful arrangements and heroic efforts of His great and good Allies.

Protected by the hand of Providence, we humbly hope and trust that we may long enjoy the blessings of peace, under your Royal Highness's mild and equitable government.

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, and to offer our warm and sincere congratulations upon the glorious termination of a contest, in which this country has borne so conspicuous a part; a contest excited and carried on by a sanguinary tyrant, for the utter extinction of the liberties of Europe, and of every thing held dear and sacred by mankind.

We ascribe the happy termination of the war, under the favour of Divine Providence, to the wise measures pursued by your Royal Highness, and by your councils and administration; to the splendid achievements of our army and navy; and to the unwearied efforts and exertions of this great country in aiding and supporting the allied arms in the sacred cause of freedom and independence, by which Europe has been rescued from slavery, and from the iron hand of military despotism, her Sovereigns and Princes restored to their dominions, the legitimate Monarch of France seated on the throne of his ancestors, and a fair prospect opened of future amity and concord between this and the neighbouring nations.

That your Royal Highness may long live to enjoy the confidence of the people, and that you may continue to prosecute the same system adopted by our beloved Sovereign, under whose mild and paternal government Great Britain has attained to so high a pitch of glory and elevation, is our sincere and ardent prayer.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders, Justices of Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Renfrew, animated with the strongest sentiments of duty and attachment to your person, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with our warmest congratulations on the glorious events that have lately passed in splendid succession before us.

We devoutly acknowledge in them the hand of that Almighty Being, who sustains universal nature, who alone can bend and controul events to the purposes of his Providence, and whose superintending power has been thus so signally manifested.

While these events present to our view the auspicious return of the blessings of peace, they lead us to contemplate with proud exultation that pre-eminence in glory, and in honour, to which Great Britain has attained, by the dignified and manly perseverance, the steady integrity, the undeviating firmness and wisdom of your Royal Highness's councils, which have given her so distinguished a share in the overthrow of tyranny and oppression, and in the establishment of peace, good order, and the relations of civilized society throughout the world.

We are penetrated with the strongest feelings of admiration at the unexampled moderation and magnanimity of the august Sovereign, who, in concert with your Royal Highness, have fought, not for extended rule, not for the pride of conquest, but for the far greater glory of giving peace and security to Europe on the firm basis of the liberty and independence of its several States, and of that balance of power, which experience and policy equally point out, as the surest means of preserving them.

We deeply participate in your Royal Highness's generous feelings towards the illustrious Sovereign now happily restored to the throne of his ancestors; and we trust that the generosity so nobly displayed on the one side, and the sensibility with which it has been received on the other, will be the foundation of lasting amity and good understanding between two great nations, so formed by nature to benefit each other.

We should be wanting to the feelings most grateful to our hearts, if we did not express to your Royal Highness, in the warmest terms of which we are capable, our admiration of the bravery, zeal, and discipline exhibited by His Majesty's fleets and armies on every occasion during the long and arduous contest; and the gratitude indelibly impressed on our minds, for services which have so eminently contributed to the glorious result.

That the sun of prosperity which has shone on your auspicious rule, may extend its benign influence, and shed on your Royal Highness its brightest rays, and that in the increasing greatness and prosperity of the people committed to your charge, your Royal Highness may receive the reward, which the

generosity and benevolence of your heart will so fully appreciate, is our most ardent wish and prayer.

To His Royal Highness George, PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble Address of the Provost, Magistrates, and Common Council of the Town of Paisley.

WE, the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of Paisley, in Common Council assembled, beg leave to address your Royal Highness with renewed sentiments of attachment to His Majesty's person and family, and to the constitution of the United Kingdom, over which His Majesty hath so long presided.

We rejoice in the happy prospect now afforded, of a termination of the calamities of war, and of a speedy restoration of the royalty, liberty, and independence of those nations in Europe so long enthralled by lawless and tyrannical domination.

We rely on the wisdom of those councils, who have hitherto directed resources so happily employed in defence of our own, and in the aid of neighbouring States; and are grateful to Divine Providence for the success which has accompanied the exertions of our national forces, in arresting the progress of despotic ambition.

Confiding in the integrity and ability of those appointed to superintend our interests as a commercial country, we have no doubt that in the treaties to be concluded, befitting attention will be paid for maintaining and securing that pre-eminence which we have so long enjoyed, and which, from our unprecedented exertions for the prevention of universal subjugation, is in these times imperiously requisite.

We pray that the throne of the United Kingdom may ever remain unshaken, and that His Majesty and august Family may long sway the sceptre over a loyal, religious, and prosperous people.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither,*

the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to discontinue proceedings in certain actions already commenced, and to prevent vexatious suits against spiritual persons under an Act passed in the forty-third year of His present Majesty, and further to continue, until the twentieth day of July one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, an Act of the present session of Parliament for staying proceedings under the said Act.

An Act for providing a convenient house, with suitable accommodations, for His Majesty's Judges, at the Assizes for the county of Warwick.

An Act for fixing the rates of subsistence to be paid to innkeepers and others on quartering soldiers.

An Act for enlarging and amending the powers and provisions of the several Acts for making the London Docks.

An Act for enabling the Severn and Wye Railway and Canal Company to raise a further sum of money for the completion of their works.

An Act for the better management and relief of the poor in the parish of Lewisham, in the county of Kent, and for better assessing and collecting the parochial rates in the said parish.

An Act for amending and more effectually carrying into execution the purposes of certain Acts of the sixteenth, twenty-third, and twenty-ninth years of His present Majesty, for the better relief and employment of the poor within the hundred of Forehoe, in the county of Norfolk.

An Act for amending the powers and provisions relating to the poor's rates, of an Act of His present Majesty, for maintaining the poor and cleansing the streets in the parish of Saint George, in the county of Middlesex.

An Act for enlarging and improving the Minster Yard of the cathedral and metropolitan church of Saint Peter, in York, and other places adjacent thereto.

An Act to enable the Birmingham Mining and Copper Company to sue and be sued in the name of their Secretary.

An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act of His present Majesty, for encouraging the art of making new models and casts of busts, and other things therein mentioned; and for giving further encouragement to such arts.

An Act for altering and enlarging the term and powers of three Acts made for repairing the high road leading from Brent Bridge, in the county of Devon, to Gasking Gate, in or near the borough of Plymouth, in the said county of Devon.

An Act to continue the term and alter and enlarge the powers of an Act of the twenty-ninth year of His present Majesty, for enlarging the terms of several Acts for repairing the roads from Coleshill, through the city of Lichfield, and the town of Stone, to the end of the county of Stafford, in the road leading towards Chester, and several other roads in the said Acts mentioned, in the counties of Warwick and Stafford, and city and county of the city of Lichfield.

An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in repair the road leading from Sturry-Street to Herne-Bay, in the county of Kent.

An Act for making and maintaining a road from Balderston to Burscough-Bridge, in Walton-in-le-Dale, in the county-palatine of Lancaster.

An Act for continuing the term and altering and enlarging the powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for widening and maintaining the road leading from the east side of the market-place in New Sleaford, to and through the town of Anwick, in the county of Lincoln, and other roads therein mentioned in the said county, and for building a bridge over the Witham, at or near Tattershall-Ferry.

An Act for making and maintaining a turnpike road from Swindon to or near Knighton Farm, in the parish of Ramsbury, and from Liddington to the road leading from Swindon to Marlborough, in the county of Wilts.

An Act for continuing and enlarging the term and powers of an Act, for making a road from Stand Edge, within Saddleworth, in the county of York, to or near Mumps Brook, in the township of Oldham, in the parish of Prestwick, in the county of Lancaster, and other roads therein mentioned.

An Act for repairing the road from the Maidstone turnpike-gate on the Loose-road, near Sutton-Lane, in the parish of Maidstone, to the King's-Head Inn, in Sutton-Valence, in the county of Kent; and for making and repairing other roads therein mentioned, in the said county.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of two Acts of His present Majesty, for repairing, widening, and altering the road from Crickhowell, in the county of Brecon, to the Cross-Hands, beyond New-Inn, in the turnpike-road between the city of Hereford and Ross, and other roads therein described.

An Act for continuing and amending an Act of the thirty-third year of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from the turnpike-road between Gateshead and Hexham, near Lobley-Hill, in the county of Durham, to Burtryford, in the parish of Stanhope, in the same county, together with several branches therefrom.

An Act for continuing and amending two Acts of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from the Guide-Post at the west end of the town of Hampton, over Sunbury-Common, to the town of Staines, in the county of Middlesex.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for amending, widening, altering and repairing the road from Swell-Wold to the turnpike road from Tewkesbury to Stow, in the county of Gloucester, and from the parish of Cheltenham, in the said county of Gloucester, to Sedgborough, in the county of Worcester, and from the town of Winchcomb, in the said county of Gloucester, to the said turnpike-road from Tewkesbury to Stow.

An Act to continue the term, and alter and enlarge the powers of three Acts of His present Majesty, for amending the road from Besselsleigh through Wantage to Hungerford, in the county of Berks, and other roads in the said Acts mentioned, in the said county and in the county of Wilts.

An Act for amending, improving and keeping in repair, the road from the town of Burnley, in the county-palatine of Lancaster, to the turnpike-road leading from Bury to Haslingden, at or near Edenfield-Chapel, in the township of Tottington Higher End in the same county.

An Act to continue the term and alter and enlarge the powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from Storte to Lane End, and to the road between Leek and Sandon, on Meir Heath, and from thence to Blithe Bridge, and also from Meir to Trentham, and from thence to Stapleford Bridge, and the road from Walton to Eccieshall, in the county of Stafford.
