

We do hereby, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, strictly charge and command all His Majesty's Officers both at sea and land, and all other His Majesty's subjects whatsoever, that they forbear all acts of Hostility, either by sea or land, against the kingdom of France, her Allies, her vassals or subjects, under the penalty of incurring His Majesty's highest displeasure.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the sixth day of May, in the fifty-fourth year of His Majesty's reign, and in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fourteen.

Board of Green Cloth, St. James's-Palace, May 30, 1814.

In the Name and on behalf of His Majesty, by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent's Command:

NOTICE is hereby given, that all carriages proceeding to Her Majesty's Drawing-Room, at the Queen's-Palace, on Thursday the 2d of June, are to fall into the line at the top of St. James's-Street, go along Cleveland-Row, and through the Stable-Yard into the Park, and set down with their horses heads towards Buckingham-Gate; after setting down, they are to wait in the Birdcage-Walk, and on the Parade opposite the Horse-Guards: in taking up they are to go along the road of the Mall, or the walk adjoining, and to go out at Buckingham-Gate.

No hackney-coaches will be permitted to come into the Park, but must set down at the outside of Buckingham-Gate.

The gate at the top of Constitution-Hill will be open only for carriages belonging to

- The Ministers,
- The Great Officers of State,
- The Officers of the Household,
- The Foreign Ministers,
- The Gold Stick,
- The Speakers of the Houses of Lords and Commons,
- The Duke of St. Albans,

The servants attending the Royal Household; and their carriages are to set down at the Great Door of the Palace in the Court-Yard, and to wait at the bottom of Constitution-Hill.

Tickets for carriages going in at the gate on the top of Constitution-Hill will be delivered at the Board of Green Cloth, St. James's-Place, on Wednesday next, between the hours of one and three o'clock.

Chairs are to enter the Green-Park at the door in

the Stable-Yard, adjoining the Queen's Library, to proceed across the green, and to set down at the Great Door of the Palace, and to wait within the railing.

Carlton-House, May 30, 1814.

This day Mr. Edmund Bourke, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from His Majesty the King of Denmark, had a private audience of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, to deliver his credentials; to which he was introduced by the Earl of Liverpool, and conducted by Robert Chester, Esq. Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, May 31, 1814.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Arthur Farquhar, Esq. a Post Captain in the Royal Navy, Commander of His Majesty's ship Desiree, and Senior Officer of His Majesty's vessels employed in the rivers Elbe, Weser and Ems, in co-operation with the Allied troops, His Majesty's royal licence and permission, that he may accept and wear the insignia of a Knight of the Royal Swedish Military Order of the Sword, with which His Majesty the King of Sweden hath been pleased to honour him, in testimony of the high sense that Sovereign entertains of the distinguished gallantry and conduct displayed by that Officer at the siege and reduction of the fortress of Glückstadt; provided nevertheless; that His Majesty's said licence and permission doth not authorise, and shall not be deemed or construed to authorise, the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining unto a Knight Bachelor of these realms:

And His Royal Highness hath been further pleased to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered, together with the relative documents, in His Majesty's College of Arms.
