Cologne, Fan. 27. Rom Ratubonne we have an account, that the States Affembled there, had prohibited the raifing of Men in the Empire's for Forreign Service; and that complaint had been made to the Dyer, that the French had lately possessed themselves of the Catlle of Kirne, and had put forty Men into it; and that they had likewise formed a Pretension many that they had likewise formed a Pretension upon the Lordship of Ebernbourg, belonging to the Baron of Siekenzben. Our Elector has caused a Placactty be published in the Diocess of Liege, by which he forbids all his Subjects and Vasfals of that Countrey to do Homage to the French King, on pain of Confillation of their Lands, &c.

Cologne, Jan. 30. We have not in several days received any Letters, occasioned by the overflowing of the Rhine. The Water is so high here, that one may pals over the principal threets in Boats. Here is arrived an Envoye from the Elector of Branden-

Bremen Fan. 31. Yesserday we had here a great Flood of Water; fix Dykes on the Wefer are broken through, and the Water in the Countrey is so high, that the Reople are forced to remain on the tops

of their Houles to fave themselves,

Offend, Fan. 30. On the 16th Instant we were here in much fear and danger, the Sea having overflowed the great Bank without the Mempers-Gate, and carried away withit all our Outworks, with the great Half-Moon, broken down all the Draw-Bridges at the Ports, the Bridges of Communication, and the Sluyers, and entred to violently into the Town, that all People were obliged to barricado their doors, and to get into their upper Rooms. The two great Bastions have likewise been very much prejudiced. The conflernation here was inexpreflible, as well as the damages that have been fulfained in the Countrey, where a great number of Pro-ple and Gattle have been drowned. The Waters were for high and impetuous, that they passed over the Shryeo, between this place and Bruges, filled the Direct of the Fort that guards that Sluyce; carl ed away all the Palifados, and broke down the Gares and Draw-Bridges, which obliged the Governor and Garrison to revite to one of the highest Bassons, from Three in the Afternoon till near Midnight: The Water was near feven Foot high in the Fort; it clave in funder one of the Bassions, and had almost ruine tehe Fort; and hath all a broken down all the Bridges, and overflowed all the sluyers, and the Country about Newpart,

Bruffels, Febuzo We have repeated confirmations of the gr at Lotles luftained in this Province, Flant ders, Holland, and Zealand, by the late Inundations. The Island of Teriolen is entirely Drowned, suith unoft of its Inhabitants, except the Village of Scherpemess: the like missorrupe has befallen a great part of Tergoes, with Princeland, and most part of Zierickee. Zealand has also suffered very much. Viffing Having ean overflowed to the first stage of their Buildings,

and the greatest part of the Island being under was ter's as is also Cadjand. The inundation of Moore dike has reached to bledu; and done much hurt to its Works. Some hundreds of dead Bodles and floating upon the River of Animers, and we are told, many thousands have perilhed in this laundation, a thou and Perions being drowned in one Polder near Gaunt. The Deputies of Anthe phave represented to his Highness, that the Losses they have fullained, amount to fome Millions, and have therefore defired his Highnels to take off their Impolls and other Duties. The Water was four Fout higher then it was ever known, and near three foot high in the Great Church. Offend has fuffered also very much, and both Orders and Moneys have been fent thicker for the repairing the Works. From College we have an Account, that the overflowing of the Rithe has done much harm there. We are told that the Quarrel between the Duke of Notfolke and the Seneschal of Haynauli is renewed, his Grace having received a Challerge from the Seneichal at Bruges, as he was going for England.

Brussels Feb. 3. Every day brings us a more particular Account of the Lesses sustained by the late great Floods. In Holland and Zealand, a great many Polders are quite drowned, and will not be recovered in many years. In Handers the damage is inclimable: The Land of Assenders in trecoverably will, and above took people drowned, none elea-ting of that quarter but one mail only. Dender-mond was in very great danger, and had certainly been drowned, if the great Dyke above the Waters gate had not broken, by which means the force of the Water was turned upon the Country. Hundreds of dead Bodies are feen daily floating down the River to Answerp; and that City has suffered to much in this calamity, that it's feared it will not in many years recoved the last, and the whole Countray between that City and Lillais to ever howed, that it will require much time and coff to recover it. Their Deputies are now here, and have plainsystold his Highnels, that unless they be freed from all manner of Ducies and Imposts, they shall never be able to let about le chargeable a Work; and we fear the Deputies of Flanders will speak in the same Language when they come. Yesterday arrived here an Express from Spain, with an Account, that the Marquis de Grana was Declared Governor of Arms in these Countreys. The Prince of Chimay, Gover-nor of Luxemburg, has, we are informed, caused a strict Enquiry to be made, what Provisions are in the Place, and has found that they have enough for between two or three Months, that Place Continues to be very closely blocked up,
