

were engaged against France and her Allies; We, therefore, adoring the Divine goodness, and duly considering, that the great and public blessings of peace do call for public and solemn acknowledgments, have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding, that a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for these His mercies, be observed throughout that part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, upon Thursday the seventh day of July next; and We do strictly charge and command, that the said public Thanksgiving be reverently and decently observed by all His Majesty's loving subjects in Scotland, on the said seventh day of July next, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His wrath and indignation, and upon pain of such punishment as may be justly inflicted on all such as contemn or neglect the performance of so religious a duty: Our will and pleasure is, therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation seen, ye pass to the Market-Cross of Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there, in His Majesty's name and authority, make publication thereof, that none pretend ignorance: and Our will and pleasure is, that His Majesty's Solicitor do cause printed copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several shires, Stewarts of stewartries, and Bailiffs of regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send copies thereof to the several parish churches within their bounds, that, upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the day above-mentioned, the same may be published and read from the pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the seventeenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, in the fifty-fourth year of His Majesty's reign.

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Deputy Lieutenants, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Aberdeen, beg your Royal Highness's gracious acceptance of our most humble and earnest congratulations on the brilliant success which has crowned His Majesty's arms, and those of His Allies, in the liberation of so large a portion of the civilized world, from the oppression of a most arrogant and unprincipled system of tyrannical domination.

It is our pride to be subjects of an empire so powerful, as to have first set an example to the other nations of Europe, which has been productive of such glorious results.

We rejoice in the prospect, which these happy events afford, of the speedy restoration of secure, honourable, and permanent peace; and we beg leave to express our unalterable sentiments of veneration and loyalty to His Majesty's most sacred person, and of dutiful respect and attachment to your Royal Highness.
