

rica; provided the merchant exporter shall first swear, upon oath, that the articles so exported are intended for the use of a particular plantation or settlement, to be named in the entry outwards, and not for sale, and that the said plantation or settlement has not before been furnished with any supply of the said articles during the same season; and provided also that the exportation of the said articles shall in no case exceed the value of fifty pounds sterling for any given plantation or settlement, whether by one or more shipments, within the same season: and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Chatwynd.*

**T**HIS day the Right Honourable Thomas Hamilton, commonly called Lord Binning, and the Right Honourable William Huskisson, were, by command of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council; and took their respective places at the Board accordingly.

**I**T is this day ordered by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that the prohibition, under the Order in Council of the twentieth of January last, against the exportation of sheet copper, be, and the said prohibition is hereby taken off; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *As. B. 1814.*

**T**HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to grant to His Majesty certain stamp duties in Ireland, and to explain and amend an Act, made in the fifty-second year of His Majesty's reign, for granting stamp duties in Ireland.

An Act to repeal certain duties upon letters and packets sent by the post within Ireland, and to grant other duties in lieu thereof.

An Act to amend several Acts relating to the revenues, matters, and things under the management of the Commissioners of Customs and Port Duties, and of the Commissioners of Inland Excise and Taxes in Ireland.

An Act to repeal the additional duties of Excise on French wine imported and on spirits exported from the warehouses, and authorising the repayment of the additional duty in respect of French wine found in dealers' stocks; and authorising the Commissioners of Excise duties to repay or remit duties paid on liquors lost by accidental staying before landing.

An Act to remove doubts as to the duties and taxes heretofore imposed and levied under the authority of the several Governments in the East Indies.

An Act to remove doubts as to the allowance of drawbacks upon bibles and books of prayer to the King's Printers, under an Act passed in the thirty-fourth year of His present Majesty.

An Act to alter the mode of declaring the value of goods imported into or exported from Great Britain.

An Act to amend an Act of the thirty-ninth and fortieth years of His present Majesty, to prevent frauds and abuses in the trade of hops.

An Act for appointing Commissioners for carrying into execution an Act of this session of Parliament, for granting to His Majesty a duty on pensions and offices in England, and an Act made in the thirty-eighth year of His present Majesty, for granting an aid to His Majesty by a land tax to be raised in Great Britain, for the service of the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight.

An Act to permit the importation of tobacco and snuff into the port of Plymouth.

An Act to render valid certain indentures for the binding of parish apprentices and sentences of the settlement of poor persons.

An Act to repeal two Acts of the thirtieth and thirty-second years of King Charles the Second,
