## PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

HEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the twenty-first lay of January last, probibiting, in the name and on the behalf of His Ma jesty, the transporting into any parts out of this kingdom of any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage. masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, or other naval stores, will expire upon the eighth day of Aurust next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service, and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer, except as to the article of sheet cooper; His Royal High ness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whoseever do, at any time for the space of six months from the said eighth day o August next, presume to transport into any parts out of this king lom, any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sailcloth or canvas, or other naval stores (sheer copper excepted), or do ship or lade any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch ter, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, nowsprits, oars, oakum, sailcloth or canvas, or other naval stores (sheet copper excepted), on hoard any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, without leave or permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council. upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, initialed, "An Act to enable " His Majesty to restrain the exportation of navai " stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in " Council;" But it is nevertheless His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's ships of war, or any other ships or vessels or boats in the service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Llajesty's Board of Ordnauce, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any ship or vesse! from taking or having on board such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for the use of such ship or vessel luring the course of her intended voyage, or by licence from the Lord High Admir. of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Adneighby for the time being; nor to the exportation of the said several articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's vards or garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and his restions in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoun lland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or

factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the exportation of any of the said articles for the purposes of trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards and garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indics, or to the island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Heiena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies, the exporters of such articles do first make oath of the true destination of the same to the places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient security by bond (except as heremafter excepted), to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Mujesty's t'ustoms, to carry the said articles to the places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the purposes specified, and none other; and such bont suil not be cancelled or delivered up, until proof be made to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the production, within a time to be fixed by the said Commissioners and specified in the bond, of a certificate or certificates, n such form and manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said articles have been all duly landed at the places for which they were entered outwards. But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, nevertheless, that the following articles, viz. bar iron, white and tarred rope, yellow or mill grease, tarpaulius for waggon covers, pitch, tar, and tur-pentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon payment of the proper duties, without bond being entered into by the merchant exporter, to any of the British plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's settlements in South America; provided the merchant exporter shall first verify, upon oath, that the articles so exported are intended for the use of a particular plantation or settlement, to be named in the entry outwards, and not for saie, and that the said plantation or settlement has not before been furnished with any supply of the said articles during the same season; and provided also that the expertation of the said articles snall in no case exceed the value of fifty council steeling for any given plantation or settle-ment, whether by one or more shipments, within the same season: and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions nerein as to them may respectively appertain.
