THEREAS the Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the first day of November next, We, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Ma-jesty's Privy Council, do hereby publish and de-clare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said first day of November to Tuesday the eighth day of said month; and We have given order to the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for prorogaing the same ac-contingly. And We do further hereby, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice aforesaid, publish and floclare, that the said Parliament shall, on the eighth day of November next, be held and sit for the dis-patch of divers urgent and important affairs : And, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said eighth day of November next.

Given at the Court et Carlton-House, the twenty-fourth day of Scheenber one thousand eight "Hundred and Tonrice'n, in the fifty-fourth-year of His Majesty's reign.
