seaman fit to serve on board His Majesty's ships; to any person or persons who shall procure the voluntary service of able or ordinary seamen or landmen fit for His Majesty's service, and shall convey them on board any of His Majesty's ships or vessels, or to any of His Majesty's sea officers employed in raising men, a reward of three guineas for every such able seaman, and two guineas for every such ordinary seaman, and one guinca for every such landman, together with an allowance at the rate of one penny per mile tor each able scaman, ordinary seaman, and land-man, for every mile such man may respectively travel to the nearest of His Majesty's ships of war, or nearest place of residence of any of His Majesty's sea officers employed in raising men, provided such man shall be found fit for His Maesty's service, and there shall not be reason to suppose he is an apprentice: And whereas it is expedient, that the said several bounties, re-wards, and travelling allowance, should be continued to be paid for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth there-fore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the payment of the said bounties, rewards, and travelling allowance, be continued to the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, inclusive; and that the same be paid in the manner specified in His Majesty's several proclamations now in force for the enconragement of seamen and landmen to enter into His Majesty's Royal Navy, and for the discovering seamen who may conceal themselves, and for giving rewards for procuring the voluntary service of seamen and landmen; whereof all persons concerned are to take notice, and govern themselves accordingly. HEREAS by an Act, passed in the fiftythird year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 155, it is enacted, that it shall not be lawful for any private person or persons to import any goods, wares, or merchandise, from any port or place within the limits of the East India Company's charter, except only into such ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as shall be provided with warehouses, together with wet docks or basins, or such other securities as shall, in the judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury for the time being, or any three or more of them, in Great Britain and Ireland respectively, he fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon, and shall have been duly declared so to be, by the Order of His Majesty in Council, in Great Britain, or by the Order of the Lord Lieutenant in Council, behalf of His Mejesty, and by and with the advices

in Ircland: and whereas the port of Liverpool has been deemed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in Great Britain to be fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is there. upon pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the port of Liverpool is a port fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon: and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly. A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

HEREAS divers marines now serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine forces did, at the time of their respective enlistments, engage to serve His Majesty for the limited period of seven years, provided His Majesty should so long require their service, and also for such further term, not exceeding six months, as should be directed by the commanding officer on any foreign station. and not exceeding three years, as should be directed by any Proclamation of His Majesty, provided always, that in the latter case the additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratifis cation of any definitive treaty, should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of the said sever years; and whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of February one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, to direct that all marines then serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine forces, who had been enlisted as aforesaid, should continue to serve therein for the term of three years after the expiration
of such limited period of seven years; provided
always, that the said additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any definitive treaty should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of such limited period of service: and whereas the war between His Majesty and the United States of America unhappily continues to exist, and marines enlisting as aforesaid, cannot therefore claim the benefit of this provision, notwithstanding a definitive treaty of peace between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty, was signed at Paris on the thirtieth of May last, and the ratification thereof was duly exchanged on the seventeenth of June following; We, taking the same into Our most gracious consideration, have therefore thought fit, in the name and on the
