M. Lien we laid at your Sacred Feet the Tender of our hearty Acknowledgments for your Majesties Gracious Declaration, as we thought our Selves in Duty or ived to express our Gratitude for so great and season able a Condescer sion; so we hoped it would be abundantly satisfactor, to all good Nen, and allay those ground-less, texts, and Jealousies which were too generally instiff'd into the Minds of your Majesties Subjects, by crafty and ill-designing Men. But finding (to our gruf) that the reflies allempts of Factious Republicans, and Ondermining Diffenters, are full vigorously carried on against the Guvernment, both in Church and State; and that we; have so far pursued their former Method of Sedition and Rebellion, that they have again projulied a most permicious Confederacy or Association, contrary to the known Laws and Establ Shment of this Rea m; and had poss bly ere this involved us in the dismal cenf quence of such an impious Conspiracy, had voryour Maje Hyes great Care and Vigitance happity disopvered, and scularably exposed to the World their Transanable Machinations, manifest in a late Model, called an Affociation, sized amongst the Karl of Shafee sbury's Papers, and Printed by your Majesties Command: As we beartily bless God for bringing to light such designs of darkniss, and thereby preventing the mischief thence threatened to this flourishing Monarchy, and the Religion now by Law established; so next under God we owe it to your Marsfries Prudence and unwearied Endeavours, to pnesegve inviolably our Peace, our Religion, and whatever is near and dear to us. For which, as we are bound to acknowledge the happy influence of your Majesties excellent. Government, so we think our Selves obliged to Declare to all the World our Abhorrence and Detestation of al Such Trayrerous Associations; and to assure your Majelly that we will never take part with them that joyn in the Rebellion of Absolom, or follow the Coun-sels of Achicophel. For as we cannot but with grief reflect on the fatal effects of the late unnatural Rebellion, so we have too mubh reason to be sensible that the same Beginnings tend to the same End: And since we now find the old Methods again made use of to imbroil both Church and State: since Faition grows numerous and daring and with invenom'd Tongues bespatter, and with Swarms of infamous Libels traduce the Government, since the Laws are villified with Contempt, and openly violated without Shame or Regret; fince the most Sacred Ob-Ligations of Oaths and Conscience, are prostituted to serve the Designs, and carry on the Interest of a Party, so that Fustice cannot be Administred, nor the Laws put in execution. We think it highly seasonable to present to your Majelly, the repeated Assurances of our Loyalty, and firm Adherence to your Majesties Person and Government, and to jour Lawful and Rightful Successor; toge-therswith our utter dislike of all such Contrivances as shal any way tend to the Subversion of the antient Monarchical Government of this Nation, or the alteration of Religion, as'the now by Law estab ished in the Church of England. And when ever your Majesty shall in your Princely Wijdom think fit to meet your People in Parliament, we shall make choice of such Representatives, as shall chearfully concur with us in these bearty Expresso s of our loyalty, and the Abborrence of Eaction in the Government, and Schisme in Religion.

Nor shall we only Detest such Prastices, but to our Power endeavour to discover such Persons as olowup the parks of Rebellion, and seek to put the Nation in a Flumes whom so we hope to see restrain'd by a vigorous Execution of the Laws so we could wish to see them convinced that your Majesty bears not the Sword in vain,

but as a Terror to Evil-doers.

May the God of Heaven (in whole Hands are the Hearts of Kings) put it into your Royal Heart; May be direct your Councils, and prosper your Proceedings, and make you to these Nations, a Second time, the Giotious Instrument of our Peace and Settlement.
