An Act for paving the footways and cross paths, and lighting, watching, cleansing, and improving the streets, lanes, and other public passages and places in the borough or town of Andover, in the county of Southampton.

An Act for taking down and rebuilding the parish church of Saint Thomas, in the town of Dudley, in the county of Worcester.

An Act to enable the Justices of the Peace for the county of Surrey to provide a proper place for the depositing and preserving the public records of the said county, together with a residence for the Clerk of the Peace for the safe custody of such records, and convenient offices for transacting his business; and also to settle a table of fees to be taken by such Clerk of the Peace.
