**A** New Great Seal for the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland having been prepared by His Majesty's Chief Engraver of Seals, in pursuance of a warrant to him for that purpose under His Majesty's royal signature, and the same having been this day presented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council, and approved by His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty; and the old Great Seal being delivered up to His Royal Highness by the Right Honourable John Lord Eldon, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the same was defaced in His Royal Highness's presence; and His Royal Highness was thereupon pleased to deliver to his Lordship the said new seal, and to direct, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that the same shall be made use of for sealing all things whatever which pass the Great Seal. *Chetwynd.*

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

**W**HIEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the thirteenth day of February last, for prohibiting the exportation out of this kingdom, or carrying coastwise, gunpowder or salt-petre,

or any sort of arms or ammunition, will expire on the thirteenth day of August next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service, and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth, therefore, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the said thirteenth day of August next), presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom, or carry coastwise, any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, or carrying the same coastwise, without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to enable His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition:" But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing in this Order contained shall prevent the exportation of any of the articles, specified in the Order in Council of the twentieth of May one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, to the coast of Africa, under the conditions contained in the said Order. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Ma-

jesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Chetwynd.*

**A**T the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 20th of *July* 1815,

**PRESENT,**

His Royal Highness the **PRINCE REGENT** in Council.

**W**HEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the thirteenth of February last, prohibiting, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, the transporting into any parts out of this kingdom of any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sail-cloth, or canvas, or other naval stores (sheet-copper excepted), will expire on the thirteenth day of August next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service, and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whosoever do, at any time for the space of six months, to commence from the said thirteenth day of August next, presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom, any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores (sheet copper excepted), or do ship or lade any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores (sheet copper excepted), on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, without leave or permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council;" But it is nevertheless His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's ships of war, or any other ships or vessels or boats in the service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any ship or vessel from taking or having on board such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for the use of such ship or vessel during the course of her intended voyage, or by licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the time being; nor to the exportation

of the said several articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards or garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the exportation of any of the said articles for the purposes of trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards and garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies, the exporters of such articles do first make oath of the true destination of the same to the places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient security by bond (except as hereinafter excepted), to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said articles to the places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the purposes specified, and none other; and such bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until proof be made to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the production, within a time to be fixed by the said Commissioners and specified in the bond, of a certificate or certificates, in such form and manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said articles have been all duly landed at the places for which they were entered outwards. But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, nevertheless, that the following articles, viz. bar iron, white and tarred rope, tallow or mill grease, tarpaulins for waggon covers, pitch, tar, and turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon payment of the proper duties, without bond being entered into by the merchant exporter, to any of the British plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's settlements in South America; provided the merchant exporter shall first verify, upon oath, that the articles so exported are intended for the use of a particular plantation or settlement, to be named in the entry outwards, and not for sale, and that the said plantation or settlement has not before been furnished with any supply of the said articles during the same season; and provided also that the exportation of the said articles shall in no case exceed the value of fifty pounds sterling for any given plantation or settlement, whether by one or more shipments, within the same season: and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Chetwynd.*

**WAR DEPARTMENT.**

*Downing-Street, August 1, 1815:*

**A** DISPATCH, of which the following is a copy, was this day received by Earl Bathurst, from Major-General Sir Hudson Lowe.

MY LORD,

Cujes, July 24, 1815.

I HAVE the honour to inform your Lordship, that the forts and ships in Toulon have this day hoisted the white flag, and that Marshal Brune and all the Generals and Admirals in that place have signed their acts of submission to the King.

The circumstances which led to this event, so far as in any way connected with the operations of the force under my orders, have been as follows:

On the first appearance of the fleet and transports, under Lord Exmouth, off the coast of France, Marshal Brune, who was opposite to Nice with a body of about five thousand infantry and three hundred cavalry, called the Corps of Observation of the Var, made immediate proposition for an armistice with the Commander of the Piedmontese force at Nice, in which object, he succeeded, and then marched directly to the relief of Toulon. On the 14th July, the day on which the troops landed at Marseilles, he caused a letter to be addressed to Admiral Lord Exmouth, inclosing copy of the armistice signed at Paris, and demanding an extension of it to the British force in this country, which was immediately rejected.

He then addressed Lieutenant-General the Marquis de Riviere, exercising the King's authority in Provence, stating his desire to send two officers to Paris, to offer the submission of Toulon, and saying he should refrain from hostilities during the ten days necessary for his communication. This proposition was also objected to, and the Marshal was informed, he must resign his authority to the officer who governed Toulon before Buonaparte's evasion, hoist the white flag, and suffer the garrison of Toulon to be composed of National Guards and Royalists, in as large proportion as the troops of the line. On the same day his letter was received by the Marquis de Riviere, information was had that he was marching towards Aix, on which I immediately ordered the whole of the British troops out of Marseilles, to take up such a position as might menace Toulon, watch him, and secure Marseilles itself against attack; but the report of his march on Aix gave way to that of his concentrating near Toulon, when the following dispositions were made by me: I directed the troops to move forward in two columns, one on the high road to Toulon, by Aubagne Gemenos and Cujes, and the other by the coast to Cassis and Ciotat, in which latter place I stationed a small garrison, and afterwards moved the column to Leques and St. Cyr, having an advance at Bandol. My own head quarters were at Cujes, having an advance at St. Anne's, with very strong ground both to my front and rear, and the power of collecting my force to act along the coast, or on the high road, as circumstances might best point out. The National Guards and Royalists occupied Beausset, Castelet, La Caliere, and other strong points in my immediate front or flank. Admiral Lord Exmouth had, in the mean time, detached one line-of-battle ship to Ciotat, and another to Bandol. The enemy's advanced posts were on the outside of the Pass of Ollioules. It was whilst the troops were in this position, the Marquis de Riviere and Marshal Brune carried on their negotiations, through the means of Admiral Ganteaume, who, on the day after the Marshal's first proposition was made, was

received in Toulon as the King's Commissioner. Various propositions were made, all with the view of gaining time. The two following were immediately rejected—that of acknowledging the King's authority, but retaining the tricolor flag, and that of requiring that the British troops should retire, and promise not to attack Toulon; on which no assurance would be given. Whilst these points were discussing, a party of the National Guards having moved to St. Nazaire, had thus turned the Pass of Ollioules, which caused so much agitation, as having occurred whilst Admiral Ganteaume was treating, that Marquis de Riviere thought proper to withdraw it, whilst I collected my left column and pushed forward an advance to support him, should the circumstance have brought forth an attack. Finally, yesterday, the submission of Marshal Brune and his Generals was received, but the regiments still refused to wear the white cockade; and it was only this day, whilst at Ollioules with Admiral Lord Exmouth, the submission of the whole was notified, and consent given to the Royalists and National Guards occupying the forts, in conjunction with a portion only of the regular troops.

The garrison of Toulon consisted of six \* regiments of the line, a regiment of marines, a detachment of three hundred cavalry, artillery, veterans, &c., battalion of half pay officers and Federalists, called "Le Battalion Sacré;" most of whom, with Marshal Murat and some of his adherents, were suffered to quit Toulon, and absconded, it is not known where, on the eve of the resolution being taken for hoisting the white flag.

The nature of the operation in which I have been engaged, has been such as to afford little opportunity of distinction for the officers and men under my orders, yet I cannot avoid expressing my sense of the zeal which animated all ranks, nor my obligations to the officers in command of brigades, Colonel Burrows and Colonel Burke, and the Officers of the Staff, for their assistance to me in all preparatory arrangements, particularly Major Sir Thomas Reade, Assistant Adjutant-General, Major Pfatt, Assistant Quarter-Master-General, Major Gamble, Royal Artillery, Major Gorreyuer, Military Secretary, Mr. Cummings, of the Commissariat, and Doctor Porteous.

Lieutenant-Colonel Faverges, of the Italian Levy, who commanded the advance, merits likewise my best thanks, as also Major Andreis, of the Staff, and Lieutenant Smith, of the Royal Engineers, by whom the duties of reconnoissance were principally exercised, and who executed them with an activity and intelligence that left me nothing to desire.

I can never sufficiently express my obligations and gratitude to Lord Exmouth and the Navy in general, for the cordial assistance they have shewn themselves disposed to render on every occasion, and for the aid in particular which I received from the Marines, of which a battalion was formed, under the command of Major Cox, and placed at my disposition.

Accounts have been received that Antibes has hoisted the white flag, so that there is now no declared enemy in the South of France.

**T**HE following Addresses have been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Addresses His Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

WE, the Noblemen and Gentlemen, Justices of Peace, Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply and other heritors of the county of Fife, in a general meeting at Cupar, the 25th day of July 1815, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness to express our sincere affection to your Royal Person, and our cordial congratulations on the glorious events which have lately taken place. The vigour and wisdom of your Royal Highness's councils, seconded by the unexampled bravery and discipline of His Majesty's forces and those of His Allies, have led to achievements almost unexampled in the history of the British empire; and have added a lustre to the British arms unparalleled since the days of Cressy and of Agincourt. By the consequences of the ever memorable battle of Waterloo, a reasonable expectation is afforded that every thing valuable in civil society is now no longer endangered, that the daring attempt of a merciless and unprincipled adventurer has been finally disappointed; and that the nations of Europe are now freed from the risk of being overwhelmed by a military despotism, more ferocious and sanguinary than any which had occurred in the history of modern times. While we reflect with proud exultation on the share which our brave countrymen have had in these great achievements, we cannot refrain from expressing our regret at the scenes of domestic affliction with which they have been accompanied, and at the loss of so many brave and distinguished officers as have fallen in this eventful contest. But we trust that the incalculable consequences which have resulted to the interests of civilized society, will in some degree compensate for the private afflictions which have been sustained; and that the reflection that the memory of these brave men who have fallen will ever be cherished by a grateful country, will afford a melancholy consolation to those relatives who survive them. We are confident that a continuation of the same firmness and magnanimity in your Royal Highness's councils, which have hitherto produced such glorious results, will ultimately secure the freedom and happiness of Europe; and that such measures will now be taken by your Royal Highness and your illustrious Allies as will insure to His Majesty's faithful subjects a return of the blessings of peace, and the undisturbed possession of the unspeakable advantages which for upwards of a century past they have enjoyed under the dominion of

the illustrious House of Brunswick. We hope that, by the favour of Divine Providence, the arduous struggle in which this country has been engaged will soon be finally terminated; and that the unshaken loyalty of His Majesty's faithful subjects, and the valour and discipline of His armies will, under your Royal Highness's auspices, finally ensure to the latest posterity those blessings, whether sacred or civil, which this country has eminently possessed, and which so lately were completely endangered.

We cannot entertain a doubt that the glory and prosperity of the United Kingdom, will, under your Royal Highness's auspicious government, be advanced and secured; and we sincerely hope that your Royal Highness's illustrious House will continue to the latest posterity to reign in the hearts of a brave, a loyal and a grateful people.

We have only farther to entreat that your Royal Highness may be assured of the continued zeal and affection of this country, and that we will reckon no sacrifice too great in supporting and bringing the momentous contest, in which you are engaged, to a speedy and happy conclusion.

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

THE Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, Commissioners of Supply, and Heritors of the County of Berwick, request permission, with every feeling of respect, to offer to Your Royal Highness their congratulations on the late decisive success of His Majesty's arms, which, in conjunction with those of his Allies, has, under Providence, placed the independence and security of Britain and of Europe on a more firm basis, and has increased in so great a degree the splendour of these arms.

Under circumstances where the course of foreign events, apparently uncontrollable, rendered the measures adopted, and the resources exerted by Britain of more doubtful result with reference to the independence of other countries of Europe and the prosperity of Britain, the kingdom at large, and no district of it more strongly than the county which lays this Address at the feet of Your Royal Highness, relying on the wisdom of Your Royal Highness, and on those Councils, possessing the full confidence of the nation, which His Majesty and Your Royal Highness called into action, anticipated a result as honourable and beneficial as the united wisdom and strength of the kingdom could accomplish; that anticipation has been more than realised; they look with gratitude, and with increased confidence, to that hand which directed, and to those men who, under that direction, have, in Council and in execution, so illustriously promoted and confirmed, the strength of the kingdom.

The result of these measures has been, that the

power assumed by a Usurper contemplating only, and calculating with coolness and inhumanity, his own aggrandizement in the sacrifice of nations, and regardless, unless from personal motives, of the interest of his own followers, and the success which, for a time, the misguided enthusiasm and numbers of an unfortunate people conferred upon him, have terminated in his own discomfiture and annihilation; while the only effect of them, upon this kingdom, has been, to bring forward, to strengthen, and to increase its resources, its energies and its honour.

The County of Berwick, which, in difficulty and danger, presumes to address His Majesty and Your Royal Highness, and to offer its strenuous support to those measures which should be deemed expedient for the public benefit, and which has endeavoured to redeem that pledge, presumes to hope, that the congratulations which it offers in success, will be received with favour, and begs to assure Your Royal Highness, that, in the further decisive and effectual measures which it is still necessary, and which it may be deemed expedient to adopt, to secure to Europe the blessings of permanent peace, Your Royal Highness may rely on its most zealous support.

NEW STAMP DUTIES.

*Stamp Office, London, July 20, 1815.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that two Acts were passed in the late Session of Parliament, for repealing the Stamp Duties on Deeds, Law Proceedings, and other written or printed Instruments, and the Duties on Fire Insurances and on Legacies and Successions to personal Estate upon Intestacies, and also the Duties on Advertisements, Almanacks, Newspapers, Pamphlets, Gold and Silver Plate, Stage Coaches, and Licences for keeping Stage Coaches, now payable in Great Britain, and for granting new Duties in lieu thereof; and that the new Duties are to commence upon the 1st of September next; except the Duty on Fire Insurances, which is to commence on the 29th September; and the Duties on Stage Coaches and Stage Coach Licences, which are to commence on the 5th September.

A very general increase of the present duties is enacted; and some Instruments are subjected to *ad valorem* Duties which are not so at present, such as Deeds of Exchange and Partition, Leases, Settlements of Money and of Shares in the public Stocks or Funds, whether voluntary or upon Marriage, and Warrants of Attorney to confess Judgment, when given as a security for money instead of bonds or mortgages. And Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes at more than two months after date, or sixty days after sight, are charged with higher Duties than those payable at shorter periods.

The new Duties are contained in Schedules, in which the instruments and things charged are classed and alphabetically arranged, so as to afford a complete Table of Duties, in the most convenient and practical form, and to supersede any occasion for those compilations, published by private individuals, to which the profession of the law and the public have formerly found it convenient to resort. And as the Schedules will not admit of an abridgment that can be safely relied upon, the Commissioners recommend it to the profession and others not to trust to any thing else in matters of importance.

The Acts contain various provisions for securing the Duties, which are material to be attended to by those who wish to avoid penalties. And the provisions of former Acts are to be enforced, in regard to those Duties, concerning which no new provisions are enacted. With respect to the

RECEIPT DUTIES,

it is to be observed, that not only formal Receipts, but all Notes and Memorandums, whether signed or not, which shall import any acknowledgment,



that a sum of £2, or upwards, has been paid, settled, balanced, or otherwise discharged or satisfied, are liable to these Duties; and that all persons paying money are intitled to have stamped Receipts, at the expence of the persons receiving it, and on tendering a proper Stamp, may insist on having a Receipt written thereon, and on being paid for the Stamp; and that all persons refusing to give such Receipt and pay for the Stamp, as well as all persons giving a Receipt, or any such Note or Memorandum as aforesaid, without a Stamp, or upon a Stamp of insufficient value, will incur a penalty of ten pounds for every offence, which will be strictly enforced on every occasion.
