their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that  
he, she, or they may be apprehended and con-

"The Minister of the Russian Imperial Marine  
makes hereby known, that the first-Guild Merchant  
Gerebine, having undertaken to transport the wood  
belonging to Government from Narva to Reval by  
sea, the Commissioners of the Marine have granted  
him permission to build, for the greater security of  
losses, and for the more certain navigation on this  
passage, at his own expence, a light-house at the  
point Liativanem, on the south continental coast  
of the Gulf of Finland, on the east side of the  
River Kuuda in that Gulf, near the Meridian of  
Hofta.

"This light-house will be lighted up from the  
25th of the present month of August; but for the  
better discerning the light of the light-house of  
Liativanem, it will appear and disappear every  
fifteen seconds, and the light from the surface of  
the water to the light is forty feet.
