WANTED for the barracks in the counties of Devon and Middlesex, and for the barracks in the islands of Guernsey, Jersey, and Alderney, such quantities of

Straw for filling Paillasses,

as may from time to time be required by the respective Barrack-Masters for the time being.

The deliveries to commence on the 1st of January next, and to continue until the 31st of October following.

Proposals, made separately for each of the before-mentioned counties, and for the whole of the barracks in the three islands of Guernsey, Jersey, and Alderney, sealed up, and marked "Tender for Straw," will be received at this Office until twelve o'clock on Tuesday the 19th instant; but no proposal will be noticed, unless made on or annexed to a printed particular, and the prices inserted in words at length; nor unless a letter be submitted to such proposal, from a person of known property, engaging to become bound with the party tendering for the due performance of the contract.

That the deliveries are to commence on and for the 2d day of January next; that proposals in writing, sealed up and marked "Tender for Army Supplies," will be received at this Office on or before Wednesday the 20th day of December; but none will be received after twelve o'clock on that day, and, if sent by post, the postage must be paid.

Proposals must be made separately for each county, and the proposal for the island of Guernsey must include Alderney; and each proposal must have the letter which is annexed to the tender properly filled up by two persons of known property, engaging to become bound with the party tendering, in the amount stated in the printed particulars, for the due performance of the contract; and no proposal will be noticed, unless made on a printed particular, and the prices expressed in words at length; and should it so happen that during the continuance of the contract no troops should be stationed or supplied in the county, the expence of the contract and bond, paid in the first instance by the contractor, to be refunded to him by the Commissary in Chief.
