mence from the said thirteenth day of February instant), presume to transport any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places, in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in. the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or per-nrission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to empower His Majesty to reprohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to renforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or " any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to " empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms on ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intuled "An Act to enable His "Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the ex-portation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council: But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing in this Order contained shall be construed to alter or repeal the Order in Council of the twentieth of May one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, for regulating the export of gunpowder and arms to the coast of Africa, under the conditions therein specified.
