THE Court of Directors of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, do hereby give notice,

That a General Court of the said Company will be held at their House, in Leadenhall-Street, on Wednesday the 27th instant, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, to resume the consideration of the following motion, viz.

"That this Court, taking into consideration the general advantage occasioned in the price of naval stores by the long continuance of the late war, and the other reasons in which the Court of Directors have proposed to grant, to the owners of ships engaged under the new system, an addition, for the present year only, to their peace rates of freights, are of opinion, that although the owners of those ships can have no claim to any increase of rates spontaneously proposed by themselves in the way of free competition, yet, as the prices of naval stores have not, from the circumstances of the time, fallen to a peace level, and the owners are subjected to such expence in the outfit of their ships, as at their peace rates of freight must expose them to heavy loss, this Court is willing on the present occasion to grant to the said owners relief in the manner suggested by the Court of Directors, provided the same may be done with safety to the existing shipping system; and the Court doth therefore authorise the Court of Directors to request the sanction of Parliament to the grant of the proposed relief, with such precautions as may prevent it from affecting the stability of that system."
