THE Senate of the Imperial Government City of Reval, at the proper request of the Judge Baron Peter von der Pahlen, the Senator Peter Stillmarck, the Merchant of the First Guild P. G. Lohmann, and the Merchant D. G. Witte, Assignees chosen on the part of the Creditors, who have hitherto come forward and are known, of Mr. Hans Boustedt, for arranging his affairs and managing the commercial business hitherto carried on in this City, under the firm of H.
