We rejoice that the consort of our amiable Princess is of a renowned Protestant House; and it cannot but add to our gratification, that a descendant of the House of Saxony, under whose Princes the sun of the British Constitution first dawned, should be the chosen consort of the presumptive Heiress to the Crown of these dominions.
