AT a Council of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, held at Carlton-House, on the 29th day of January 1817, William Arundell Harris, of Keneggy, in the county of Cornwall, Esq. was appointed Sheriff of the said county of Cornwall for the present year, by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales in Council.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHereas by an Act passed in the fifty-sixth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to provide for a new silver coinage, and to regulate the currency of the gold and silver coin of this realm," the Master and Worker of His Majesty's Mint, in London, was authorised and empowered to coin, or cause to be coined, silver bullion into silver coins, consisting of crowns, half-crowns, shillings, and sixpences, of the standard of eleven ounces and two penny weights of fine silver, and eighteen penny weights alloy to the pound troy, and in weight after the rate of sixty-six shillings to the pound troy :

And whereas, in virtue of the powers so given, a coinage of half-crowns, shillings, and sixpences, at the rate of sixty-six shillings to the pound troy, and of the standard of fineness above-mentioned; every such half-crown piece having for the obverse impression the head of His Majesty, with the inscription "Georgius III. Dei Gratia," and the date of the year; and for the reverse, the ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom, contained in a shield, surrounded by the Garter, bearing the motto "Honi soit qui mal y pense," and the collar of the Garter, with the inscription "Britanniarum Rex Fid: Def:" with a newly invented graining on the edge of the piece; every such shilling and six penny piece having for the obverse impression the head of His Majesty, with the inscription "Georgius III. D. G. Britt, Rex. F. D." and the date of the year, and for the reverse, the ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom, contained in a shield surrounded by the Garter, bearing the motto "Honi soit qui mal y pense," with a newly invented graining on the edge of the piece, has been completed and is now ready to be delivered for the use of his Majesty's subjects; We have therefore, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Proclamation, and we do hereby ordain, declare and command, that the said pieces of silver money shall from and after the thirteenth day of this instant February, be current and lawful money of the Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful money of the said Kingdom, that is to say, such half-crown pieces as of the value of two shillings and six pence; such shilling pieces as of the value of one shilling; and such six penny pieces as of the value of six pence, in all payments and transactions of money.

And We do hereby in further pursuance of the powers given to his Majesty by the said Act, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, further proclaim, ordain, declare and name the said thirteenth day of this instant February as the day from and after which so much and such parts of the Act made in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prohibit the importation of light silver coin of this realm from foreign countries into Great Britain or Ireland, and to restrain the tender thereof beyond a certain sum," as enacts or provides or may be construed to enact or provide that any tender in silver coin of the realm shall be legal to the amount of twenty-five pounds, or a tender for any greater sum according to its value by weight. And also so much of any Act or Acts whereby the said last recited Act is continued, revived, or made perpetual, shall be repealed, and the same are by virtue of the said first recited Act, and this Our Proclamation, repealed accordingly.

And We do hereby in further pursuance of the powers given to His Majesty by virtue of the said first recited Act, in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, proclaim, ordain, declare and name the said thirteenth day of February as the

day from and after which no tender of payment of money made in the silver coin of this realm of any sum exceeding the sum of forty shillings at any one time shall be reputed a tender in law or allowed to be a legal tender within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, either by tale or weight of such silver coin, or otherwise howsoever.

WHEREAS by Our Proclamation, bearing date the eighteenth day of this instant, We thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, in pursuance of an Act passed in the fifty-sixth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to provide for a new silver coinage, and to regulate the currency of the gold and silver coin of this realm," to name and appoint the third day of February now next ensuing, as the day from and after which, and from thence until the seventeenth day of February then next ensuing, as the period of time during which it should and might be lawful for any person or persons to deliver into His Majesty's Mint any old silver coin, heretofore coined and current, which should by any officer or officers of the said Mint, to be appointed for that purpose by the Master of the Mint, be judged and deemed to be such silver coin of this realm; and the said third day of February now next ensuing as the day from and after which, and from thence until the seventeenth day of February then next ensuing, as the period of time during which there should be delivered out of the said Mint, new silver coins, as in the said Act is mentioned, pursuant to the regulations and directions thereof: And whereas We have thought fit, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to postpone the commencement of the period of time during which it shall and may be lawful for any person or persons to deliver into His Majesty's said Mint any such old silver coin, and during which there shall be delivered out of the said Mint new silver coins of equal amount according to the respective denominations of the said silver: We do hereby, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, revoke and discharge Our said Proclamation of the eighteenth of this instant January; and We do by this Proclamation, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, name and appoint the thirteenth day of February now next ensuing, as the day from and after which,

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and from thence until the twenty-seventh day of February then next ensuing, as the period of time during which it shall and may be lawful for any person or persons to deliver into His Majesty's said Mint any such old silver coin, and the said thirteenth day of February now next ensuing, as the day from and after which, and from thence until the twenty-seventh day of February then next ensuing, as the period of time during which there shall be delivered out of the said Mint new silver coins, as in the said Act is mentioned, pursuant to the regulations and directions thereof.

WHEREAS on the twenty-eighth day of this instant month of January divers persons, riotously assembled and stationed in different places in the City of Westminster, proceeded to commit certain daring and highly criminal outrages, in gross violation of the public peace, to the actual danger of Our Royal Person, and to the interruption of Our passage to and from the Parliament; we therefore, in the name and on the behalf

of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, in pursuance of an address from the two Houses of Parliament, do hereby enjoin all Magistrates, and all other His Majesty's loving subjects, to use their utmost endeavours to discover and cause to be apprehended the authors, actors, and abettors concerned in such outrages, in order that they may be dealt with according to law: And We do hereby promise, that any person or persons, other than those actually concerned in doing any act by which Our Royal Person was immediately endangered, who shall give information, so as that any of the authors, actors, or abettors concerned in such outrages as aforesaid, may be apprehended and brought to justice, shall receive a reward of

ONE THOUSAND POUNDS,

to be paid on conviction of every such offender; which said sum of one thousand pounds the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly: And We do further promise, that any person or persons concerned in such outrages as aforesaid, other than such as were actually concerned in any act by which Our Royal Person was immediately endangered, who shall give information, so as that any of such authors, actors, or abettors as aforesaid, shall be apprehended and brought to justice, shall, upon conviction of such offender or offenders, receive His Majesty's most gracious pardon.

WHEREAS by the Act of the fifty-sixth of His Majesty, cap. 104, intituled "An Act for the making more effectual provision for the prevention of smuggling, and rewarding officers and persons making seizures and capturing smuggling vessels; for licensing luggers employed in the North Sea fishery; and obliging exporters of excisable goods on drawback to give notice of shipment," it is provided, "that in case any ship or vessel liable to seizure or examination by that or any other Act of Parliament in force, shall not bring to on being required so to do, or being chased by any ship or vessel in His Majesty Navy, having the proper pendant and ensign of His Majesty's ships hoisted, or by any ship or vessel employed in the prevention of smuggling, under the authority of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise, having a pendant and ensign hoisted, of such description as His Majesty by any Order in

“ Council, or by His Royal Proclamation under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, shall from time to time in that behalf order and direct, it shall and may be lawful for the Captain, Master, or other person having the charge or command of such ship or vessel in His Majesty's Navy, or employed as aforesaid (first causing a gun to be fired as a signal), to shoot at or into such ship or vessel so liable as aforesaid;”

And whereas we think it expedient, that all such ships and vessels employed in the prevention of smuggling as aforesaid, under our authority, or that of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, or the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise, should be allowed to wear, instead of the pendant and jack appointed by the Royal Proclamations, bearing date the eighteenth December one thousand seven hundred and two, and the first January one thousand eight hundred and one, to be worn by ships and vessels employed by the Commissioners for Customs and Excise, a pendant and ensign of the following description, viz.

A pendant with a red field, having a regal crown described thereon, at the upper part next the mast; and for an ensign, a red jack, with a union jack in a canton at the upper corner thereof next the staff, and with a regal crown described in the centre of the red jack; we beg leave, with all humility, to recommend to your Royal Highness, that your Royal Highness would be graciously pleased, by your Order in Council, or by your Royal Proclamation under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to direct and appoint, that all such ships and vessels as are or may be employed in the prevention of smuggling, under our authority, or that of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, or the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise, shall be allowed to wear a pendant with a red field, having a regal crown described thereon, at the upper part next the mast; and for an ensign, a red jack, with a union jack in a canton at the upper corner thereof next the staff, and with a regal crown described in the centre of the red jack, instead of the pendant and ensign appointed by the Royal Proclamations, bearing date the eighteenth December one thousand seven hundred and two, and first January one thousand eight hundred and one, to be worn by ships and vessels employed for His Majesty's service by the Commissioners for Customs and Excise.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed; and doth hereby direct and appoint, that all such ships and vessels as are or may be employed in the prevention of smuggling, under the authority of the Lords Commissioners of the

Admiralty, or that of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, or the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise, shall be allowed to wear a pendant with a red field, having a regal crown described thereon, at the upper part next the mast; and for an ensign, a red jack, with a union jack in a canton at the upper corner thereof next the staff, and with a regal crown described in the centre of the red jack, instead of the pendant and ensign appointed by the Royal Proclamations, bearing date the eighteenth December one thousand seven hundred and two, and first January one thousand eight hundred and one, to be worn by ships and vessels employed for His Majesty's service by the Commissioners for Customs and Excise:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

We most earnestly pray, that the perpetrators of an act so atrocious in its nature may speedily be delivered over to the justice of their country; and that Divine Providence may preserve your Royal Highness for many years, and cause you to live in the affections of a generous and loyal people. And we assure your Royal Highness, that there are not in this United Kingdom men more determined, at any sacrifice, to protect your Royal Highness's person, and to preserve inviolate the Constitution

and the Laws, than His Majesty's faithful Citizens of London.

May it please your Royal Highness,

THE Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of His Majesty's faithful and loyal City of Dublin, have heard with horror and felt with indignation the vile and atrocious attempt to assassinate your Royal Highness.

Speaking the undisguised feelings of their hearts, and their sincere opinion of all their fellow subjects, they presume to say to your Royal Highness that if it had been your Royal Pleasure, as it was your unquestionable right to have called your Parliament in any other part of the united kingdom, conduct so detestable would not have been manifested by the most daring Traitor. In Dublin it could not happen; in Edinburgh it would not happen to a Prince, who, treading in the footsteps of his beloved father, has preserved the Constitution inviolate, has conducted to a glorious and happy termination the most arduous war in which Britain has ever been engaged; has preserved his people from oppression, has given freedom to the African, and delivered from bondage the Christian slaves. We cannot but observe with what mischievous alacrity the disaffected few are availing themselves of the present moment of general pressure and privation to excite discontent, and sow the seeds of confusion and tumult. They profess, indeed, a regard for the poor, and pretend to lament their sufferings, whilst generally speaking, they and they alone have abstained from contributing to the relief of the distresses they so loudly bewail. They profess also a love of their country, but what credit do they deserve for this profession, who, insensible to the value of its preservation from the contagion of revolutionary principles, and the ascendancy of French arms, to which the rest of Europe in succession bowed the neck, and insensible even to the immortal honour and renown our country has acquired under your Royal Highness's Government, by its heroic achievements in arms, and by the final overthrow of Europe's scourge; would make a handle of the unavoidable sacrifices the glorious conflict cost, for plunging their country into disorder and ruin? These men, too, pretend to a regard to the constitution, who, unmindful of its inestimable benefits, would scruple not to endanger its utter subversion, for the sake, as themselves avow, of trying the experiment of visionary schemes of improvement? declaiming vehemently against its alleged abuses, they are regardless of its practical blessings, and intent only upon the accomplishment of their own wild projects, forget that it is not given to human institutions to attain absolute perfection.

Happy, however, are we to reflect, that the manifestation of any such disposition to distract and confound has been confined to persons, either factious from long habit and known destitution of loyal principles, or to such as through ignorance have been misled by them, with hardly the exception of one public body, and wholly without countenance or encouragement from any men of weight or consideration in the country.

Whilst, therefore, we implore your Royal Highness to adopt, and to recommend to Parliament the adoption of prompt and effectual measures for the protection of your own sacred person, and for counteracting the designs of the ill-disposed, we beg to assure your Royal Highness, that at all times, and under all circumstances, the citizens of Oxford will stand forward in the support and defence of the Throne and the Constitution, with unshaken zeal and devotion.
