Council, Freemen, and other Inhabitants of the Borough and Town of Bandon, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with our sincere congratulations on your Royal Highness's providential escape from the late flagitious outrage, meditated against your Royal Highness's sacred Person, when returning from opening the present Session of Parliament.

We lament to think that any man is to be found in the community, so daring or so deluded as either of his own bad spirit, or as the instrument of disaffection, to attempt so treasonable and so atrocious an act, and we cannot but view it as resulting from that excitement of popular feeling, which evil-minded persons have of late so laboured to produce, exciting in the lower orders a spirit of sedicion and violence, by taking advantage of the distresses of the country.

Duly appreciating the many blessings which the people of this empire have enjoyed, under the mild and beneficent sway of the Illustrious House of Branswick, we are convinced the great body of His Majesty's subjects are actuated by an unshaken devotion to your Royal Highness's Person and Family, and that there exists among them sufficient good sense, as well as loyalty, successfully to resist the arts that are used to seduce them.

E Impressed with these sentiments, we beg to be permitted to express a confident hope, that your Royal Highness will omit no precaution for preserving the public peace, and that the measures of your Royal Highness's Government, being founded on sound and wise principles, will aid the strong disposition of the people of this united empire, to uphold and hand down uninjured to posterity our admired Constitution, in Church and State.

The humble Address of the Imbabitants of the Parish of St. Michael's, in Dublia.

WE, the Minister, Churchwardens, and Parish-ioners of the Parish of St. Michael's, in the City of Dublin, duly assembled, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, in order to express our un-leigned gratitude to Divine Providence for protecting your Royal Highness from the late assault upon your Royal Person, by a depraved and infuriate rabble; an act of treasonable violence outraging at once all laws human and divine, and hostile equally. to the Majesty of the Throne, the principles of the Constitution, and the westere of the State. We cannot reflect on this outrage without the consoling conviction, that it must be regarded with the same abhorrence which we ourselves feel by all our fellow subjects, however otherwise differing in religious or political opinions, except only those malignant agitators who seek their own exaltation in public confusion and calamity, and those blind dupes to their insidious arts, who are taught, whatever be the cause of public distress, whether it be the scourge of war or the severity of the seasons, the hand of man or the visitation of God, to charge that distress as a crime on their governors; but we trust all such delusions must speedily be dissipated, by that anxious vigilance with which your Royal Highness labours to alleviate the inevitable distresses of your people, and exhibit a bright example of that self-denial and liberality, which, if universally followed, must so materially lessen the present pressure on the lower orders: and we feel convinced that the powers vested in your Royal Highness at this dangerous crisis, by the wisdom of the Legislature, will be supported by the exer-tions of every loyal and public-spirited citizen, and will effectually maintain the public tranquillity.

We conclude with humbly entreating your Royal Highness to accept the assurance of our analterable attachment to your Royal Highness's Person and Government, and our unfeigned prayer that the same Providence which has hitherto so signally protected the British Empire, may still be extended to it under your Royal Highness and your Illustrious House, securing to us and our posterity the invaluable blessings of religion and liberty, of national prosperity and glory, and to your Royal Highness and your successors the approbation of
