

LONDON. At the General Session of the Peace of our Lord the King, holden for the City of London, at the Guildhall, within the said City, on Monday the 19th day of May, in the Fifty-seventh Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, before Matthew Wood, Esq. Mayor of the City of London, Sir John Perring, Bart. Sir James Shaw, Bart. Sir William Leighton, Knight, Joshua Jonathan Smith, Esq. Samuel Birch, Esq.
