Notice is hereby given (pursuant to an Act of Parliament, made in the eighth year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act for the amendment of the Law relating to Actions on the Statute of the Hue and Cry,") that John Eggleton, of the Parish of Rickmersworth, in the County of Hertford, Salesman, on the 30th day of July last past, between the hours of Seven and Eight of the Clock in the Afternoon of the same day, was, whilst

riding on horseback, stopped and robbed by three persons on foot, in the highway which leads from and out of the turnpike-road between Uxbridge, in the County of Middlesex, and Beaconsfield, in the County of Buckingham, near the 17th mile stone on the said turnpike-road, in the Parish of Denham, in the Hundred of Stoke, in the County of Buckingham, to the Parish of Rickmersworth, in the County of Hertford, to wit, at or near a certain hill or place in the said highway, commonly called or known by the name of North Moor-Hill, in the said Parish of Denham, in the said Hundred of Stoke, in the said County of Buckingham, which the said highway wherein the said robbery was committed, lies within the said Hundred of Stoke, in the said County of Buckingham, one of which said three persons was a tall stout man, and wore a round black hat, a scarlet jacket, a light coloured spotted waistcoat, nankeen pantaloons, and a pair of bessian boots with tassels, and a large stick or bludgeon in his hand;—another of the said three persons was a middle sized man, and wore a round black hat, a fustian shooting jacket, a dark waistcoat, light coloured breeches, and high shoes, and had also a large stick or bludgeon in his hand;—and the other of the said three persons was rather a short man, with a round face and very fresh coloured, and wore a round black hat, a short round smock frock, dark coloured velveten breeches, and high shoes, and had also a large stick or bludgeon in his right hand; which said three persons cut out the pocket of the said John Eggleton's close coat, and took the said pocket from the said John Eggleton; and the said three persons then and there also took from the said John Eggleton a red leather pocket-book, containing one hundred and twenty-three pounds in notes, several whereof were Uxbridge bank notes respectively, of the value of ten pounds, five pounds, and one pound each, and the remaining notes were of the Bank of England respectively, of the value of one pound each, and the said three persons then and there also cut the said John Eggleton's breeches pocket on the right side, and took from the said John Eggleton four pounds thirteen shillings and sixpence in silver, part whereof were pieces passing as money commonly called bank tokens, of the value of three shillings each, other part whereof were pieces passing as money, commonly called half crowns, of the value of two shillings and sixpence each, other part whereof were pieces passing as money, commonly called eighteen penny pieces, of the value of one shilling and six pence each; other part whereof were pieces passing as money, commonly called shillings, of the value of one shilling each, and the residue whereof were pieces passing as money, commonly called sixpences, of the value of sixpence each. And the said three several persons then severally made off through a wood towards the Parish of Chalfont Saint Peter, in the said County of Buckingham.
