THE following Address has been presented to His Serene Highness the Prince Leopold of Saxe Cobourg; which Address His Serene Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To His Serene Highness Leopold George Frederick, Prince of Saxe Cobourg, &c. &c. &c.

May it please your Serene Highness,

WE, the Consul, Merchants, and other British Residents in the City of Oporto, humbly present to your Serene Highness our affectionate and sincere condolence on the lamented death of the Princess Charlotte of Wales, your Serene Highness's illustrious and beloved consort.

When we contemplate a calamity of such great national interest, and so peculiarly painful to yourself, we cannot in any adequate terms convey a sense of the importance we attach to so melancholy an event.

Yet we will not, Most Noble Prince, aggravate your sorrows by dwelling on the exemplary virtues of her now departed, but wish only to impress on the mind of your Serene Highness, how deeply we participate in your distress, and how warmly we sympathize with our countrymen in feelings not less universal than sincere.

Queen's-Palace, February 25, 1818.

This day His Excellency the Duke de San Carlos, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from His Catholic Majesty Ferdinand the Seventh; Mr. Rush, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the United States of America; and the Count Ludolf, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from His Majesty the King of the Two Sicilies, had their first private audiences of Her Majesty; to which they were respectively introduced by the Earl of Morton, Her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain, and conducted by Robert Chester, Esq. Assistant-Master of the Ceremonies.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for granting to the Reverend William Tournay, Doctor in Divinity, the place and dignity of a Prebendary of the Cathedral Church of Saint Peter, Westminster, void by the death of the Reverend John Wheler.
