prehensions his arrival in these parts, and the diligence he used in his Journey, had given us; and we hope, That notwithitanding all the difcouries that, have of late been fo common, as if a War was going to break out, the Peace will be continued, and the differences that are now depending, happily compofed. Our Advices from Germany do not at prefent fay any thing of the March of the Imperial Troops towards the Rhine; and it's believed that while the affairs of Hungary are in that uncertainty which they are at prefent, the Emperor will not fend any confiderable Body of Men into the Empire. The diforders at Liege encrease daily, and are now come to a very great height, the Burghers having been in Arms for leveral days, and have diplaced two of their Burgermalled, (who are thereupon, to avoid the infolence of the Rabble, retir'd to Maeftricht) and put all things into confusion.

Paris, Fuly 11. Orders have been fent to Mon-ficur du Quefne, of whole arrival at Thoulon we have already given you an account, to put immediately to Sea again with the Ships defigned against Argiers, the King being refolved to profecute the War against that Government with all the vigor imagible. Since the diffolving of the Allembly of the Clergy, it has been difcourfed as if a way would be found to compose the differences batween this Court and that of Rome; though at the fame time we do not fee but the King is refolved to maintain his Edict upon the late Declaration of the Clergy,
