mighty, deprived our revered Monarch in his utmost need of the soothing attentions of his faithful august Spouse, and the nation of a Queen whose example was so eminently calculated to support the interests of religion and morality. We at the same time deeply lament that under the cares of Government devolved on your royal person, the feelings of your Royal Highness both as a parent and a son have been so severely wounded in the course of one fatal twelvemonth.

That the Father of Mercies may sanctify these domestic calamities to your Royal Highness, to the whole of the Royal Family, and to the nation at large; and that your invaluable life may be long preserved a blessing to the State, are the earnest prayers of, may it please your Royal Highness, His Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbytery of Ayr.
