Hague, July 25. The Deputies of Zealand fome few daies trace arrived here, and preis hard for the admission of the P.ince of Orange into the Councel of Sate. This aftermoon 'tis believed the States of Holland will come to fome refolution as to the disposal of all vacant charges and Offices, both in relation to the Prince , and others Subordinsts. The Officers of the Flying Army are not as yet all of them no-minated; amongst the reft of the Officers that are to command, 'tis faid, that Prince Maurice and General Wurty are to be imployed as Marelchals of the Camp; the Plince of Tarente to com nend the Hale, the Rhingrave to be his Lleutenant ; the Count de Hoorn to be M jor General of the A my , and M infiest Nortwich G eat Mattes of the Artillery. Monfi ur D'Effrades intends to leave this place on Monday next; all the Plenipotentiaries are returning to Breds, to expect there the arrival of the English Ambassa-The Count de Guich has chrained permiffion to re u:o to France.

There is no: at prefent observed to be that fondness as formeily betwixt the Stares and the French, upon a late Remonftrance mide by the French Ambaffador to the States, telling them, that it was now high time to give his Maiter fatisfacti-on up on his defires, in confideration of his pretentions upon the Netherlands, before they entred upon any farther busines: They told him in return, that it was also time for them to renew their former League, in pursuance of a Clause in the Treaty made in the year 1653. touching the division of

the Spanish Netherlands.

Bruges, July 27. Since the taking in of Courtrick, the French are encamped neer Ipres, but have not attempted any thing: The valour of 150 English that were in the Cittadel at Courtrick is highly extell'd, having in the first affault made on them by the French, kill'd between 4 and 500 men ; and had they been well seconded by the new raised Forces that were with them , might have done very confiderable fervice. The 15 inftent the City of Bruffels was aflarmi'd by 1000 French, who pillaged two or three small Burghs within three or f ur leagues of the City , commanding the Country upon the penalty of Fire and P.under to bring in their Corn having left the French Court in a diffuft, came into Bruffels, defiring to erve in the Spanish Army as a Volunteer ; he was civilly received by the Marque's de Caffel Rodrigo, who has given him the Command of a Regiment, the occasion of his discontent being faid to spring from his too eagerly pursuing his right to the Office of Grand Veneur of France, which his Majesty had di posed of to another, and applying himself for radress to the Parlisment of Paris, by which he incurred his Maj fties displeasure. and fo left the Court.

Paris, July 27. On Friday last the King lay at Arras, and on Sunday in the evening arrived with the Quren at Dougy; 'tis believed they intend to go also to Courtrick; 'tis laid the Army intend to lay their nex: Siege to Bendermonde, not for diffant from Ghent. The Daulphin arrived yefter lay

at Vincennes, where he intends to continue.

The Marquis de Crequy having laid Slege to a little Ci y of Luxenburg, call'd Lebick, which has hitherto ferved as a retreat to the Pealants, who from thence have frequently fallen upon his Souldiers, killing as many of them as they could light up in , has fince obliged them to hang up the Sheriff of that place at the Gate for giving encouragement to them, and forced them to dimantle and defroy their Town.

The King has ordered great stores of Victua's and Ammunition to be fent into Courtrick : 'Tis confi lently fald, that Oudenard despairing of making refistance against our Army, has fent away their Souldiers, and prepare themfelves to
