

with business is to change the Magistrates, and having done that, will visit *Ostend* and *Newport*. The affairs of *Liege* are in as unquiet a posture as ever, there being very little appearance of uniting the divided Interests of those Magistrates, whose divisions will, it's probable, at last bring on them a Foreign Power that will Master both Parties. From *Alsace* they write, That Monsieur de *Louvoij* was arrived there, and was visiting the several Garisons in that Country. The Rebels in *Hungary*, with the assistance of the Turks, make great progress, which has obliged the Emperor to raise the *Ban* and *Arrierman* of that Kingdom, to be commanded by the Palatin, to whom he has sent 100 thousand Florins, to be employed in that Service.

*Brusse s*, Sept. 18. Yesterday an Express passed through this place, with Letters from the Prince of *Orange* to the Marquis de *Grana*, who, it's now said, will make a longer stay in *Flanders* than he at first intended. Monsieur de *Louvoij*, having visited the most important places in *Alsace*, is on his return, thereby freeing those parts of the apprehensions they had that the occasion of his Journey was to execute some great design. Our Letters from *Vicenna* give a very ill account of the affairs of *Hungary*, where the Turks do now act by themselves, and declare they will keep the places they take, so that they have begun a War.

*Hague*, Sept. 19. The States of *Holland* are now assembled, and are busied with several affairs relating to this Province. Our Letters from *Vicenna* of the sixth Instant give an account, That General *Caprara* was on his march with 7000 Imperialists, which had had their Rendezous in the Island of *Schurz*; That on the first of this Month he passed the River *Waag*, near *Leopoldstads*, and was gone to join General *Strafaldo* in order to the relief of *Vilbecke*, which is besieged by the Turks; That the Palatin of *Hungary* was gone to raise the *Ban* and *Arrierman* of that Kingdom, and that he had undertaken in a very short time to join the Imperial Army with 6000 Horse; and that the Emperor, as was reported, had received advice from his Minister at *Constantinople*, that the Grand Vizier would take the Field, and put himself at the head of the Ottoman Forces in *Hungary*.

*Paris*, Sept. 19. On the 22 of this Month the Court leaves *Versailles*, and goes for *Chambord*, the Regiment of Guards, and the other Troops of the Kings Household parted two or three days ago to attend the King there. Orders have been sent to *Marseilles* to fit out with all diligence 15 Gallies, but with what design is not said.

*Windsor*, Sept. 12. On Wednesday the 30th of *August* last, His Majesty being present, Sir *Samuel Morland's* new Engine was set to work, being of a different but much better figure and Movement than the former, and by him invented and erected purposely for future security against Floods and Inundations, and from that time has daily forced up great quantities of Water into the Castle and Pond, without the least error or amendment, and with His Majesties great approbation.
