with fuch unequal Forces as they had, to advance towards *Villecke*, and that thercupon Orders have been fent to the Imperial Troops in *Bohemia*, *Moravia*, Sc. to march with all possible diligence for *Eungary*.

Straburg, Sept. 2.4. There parts afford at prefent very little News; we expected to have been better flored upon the arrival of Monfieur *de Louvay*, but his flay here was very flort, he returning in great hafe for *Paris*, to attend the King in his Journey to *Chambor*. Our Mag firates did reprefent to him, That it was impossible for them to pay the great Sums of Meney that are required of them towards the Guillon that is kept here, but they were anfwered. That it was reafonable they floud bear the Charge, fince they had the Benefit, in the proy flout that was thereby made for their Security.

Cologne, Sept. 18 The Sieur Fodeci, the Imperial Minifler, continues his endeavours for the compoling the affairs of Liege, he has defined that his Electoral Highnefs will authorize the Popes Nuncio and himfelf to go to Liege to accommodate matters, but it's believed no hing will be done therein till the Bifhop of Straaburg arrives here.

Zell, Septi 22. We are adured that all things relating to the Marriage of the Prince of Hanouer with the Prince of Zell, are concluded; and that it will very fuddenly be Solemnized.

Hamburg, Sept. 25. The Duke of Holftein is ftill here, and intends as we underfland to pais the Winter in this City. There feems to be no good understanding between the King of Denmarks and him, which is believed to be the reason his Highneis leaves Gottorp, the usual place of his Refidence. From Sweden they write, That the French Ambaffador did all he could to render the Negotiation of the Count d'Altheim, the Imperial Minifler, unfuctesful, but that hitherto his endravours had had no great effect, and that it was faid, That an Alliance was Treating between the Emperor and the Kings of Sweden and Peland. We have Letters from Hungary which inform us, That the Turks and Hungarians encrease in strength daily, so that it will be neceffary that the Emperor draw his whole Force that way, to make head against thom.

Bruffe's, Sept. 29. The Marquis de Grana continues still in Flanders, and has obtained of those States an advance of 50000 Crowns for a prefent Supply: His Excellency is endeavouring to reform many abuses that have crept into the Civil Government of that Province, which creates him a great deal of bufinefs, and makes his return hither as yet uncertain. From Linge they write, That the Factions in that City encrease daily, and that there is at prefent very fmall appearance of an accommon dation of the differences between their Prince and themer Your last Letters from V.enna give us an account, That General Caprara was loyned with Count Swafoldo, but that they did not look upon themfelves to be firong enough to relieve Villecke, and therefore expected the coming up of more

Forces before they would attempt it. Hague, Sept 29. On Friday his Highness the Prince of Grange returned hither from Dieren, and on Sunday his Highness-parted from hence, again for Breda, to visit the new Fortifications that are making there. Pursuant to the Orders which the St. tes-General have fent to the Heer Van Starenberg, their Amballador in France, we are informed his Excellency has prefented a fecond Memorial to the French King, concerning the affairs of Orange, by which he represents the ill confequences these Proceedings may have, and defires that King to withdraw his Troops, to repair the damages which the City of Orange has fuffered by them, and to leave those Inhabitants in the free and quiet enjoyment of their Trade and Commerce. The States of Frizeland and Groningen have defired that the Troops which are of their repartition may not be drawn out of their Provinces, declaring, That otherwife they will not pay them. The Prince of Orange, before he returns hither, will have an Interview with the Marquils de Grana, Governor of the Spanish-Netherlands.

Paris, Sept. 26. On Monday laft their Majeffics parted from Verfailles on their Journey for Chambor, where they propoled to arrive as this day. The Dauphin and Dauphinels remain at Verfailles, but the Dauphin intends to go and make the King a Vilit at Charkbor, and having done it, to return to Verfailles. Monfieur de Louvoy parted from hence yesterday for Chambor.

Sr. Edmonds-Bury, Sept. 18. This day the Right Honourable the Earl of Arlington, Lord Chamberlain of His Majeflies Houfhold, and Lord Lieutenatt of this County, having appointed a meeting of the Deputy Lieutenants here, carie hither, accompanied by his Grace the Duke of Grafton: They were met on the way by the Deputy-Lieutenants, and a great number of the principal Gentlemen of the Country, who waited upon them into the Town, where they were received by the Alderman and Burgefles in their Formalities, and haying fuent the Afternoop in Confultation-with the Deputy-Lieutenants, about matters relating to the Militia of the County, returned in the Evening to Ewflore.
