At a period when the most daring attempts are made by wicked and artful men to mislead the unwary, and to spread infidelity and disorder throughout your kingdom, we feel it to be peculiaity incombent on us to express to your Majesty tour high veneration for the Laws and Constitution of country, our grateful sense of the manifold blessings which we enjoy under your mild and equitable administration, and our just abhorrence of those impious doctrines which are alike subversize of the Throne; of our King, and the Altar of our God.

We trust, that, by the blessing of Heaven on the busited exertions of the wise and the good, the artiwhices of the turbulent will be speedily frustrated; athat the same Almighty arm which enabled our fathers to rear the glorious fabric of the British Constitution; will coutings to preserve it unimpaired as the richest inheritance, of their children; and that the sacred influence of our holy religion, whose foundation is immoveable, will yet reach the hearts even of those who now impiously assail it, and lead all orders of your Majesty's subjects to gultivate that righteousness which is the only certain ground of private happiness and national prosperity.

Your Majesty may rely on the continuance of our zealous endeavours to guard the people who are committed to our pastoral care from every false and pernicious doctrine, to cherish in their breasts those sentiments of love and reverence which are Ane to their Sovereign, and to animate them in the faithful discharge of every Christian duty.
