Carlton-House, January 23, 1821.

THIS day His Majesty proceeded in state from Carlton-House to the House of Peers, where he arrived at a quarter before two o'clock; and, having alighted from the state coach, he was received at the portico by the Great Officers and others, and proceeded to the robing room in the customary manner; His Majesty was there robed, his hat on his head, and the procession moved into the House in the usual order.

His Majesty being seated on the Throne, the Great Officers and others standing on the right and left, Sir Thomas Tyrwhitt, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to deliver the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I HAVE the satisfaction of acquainting you, that I continue to receive from Foreign Powers the strongest assurances of their friendly disposition towards this Country.

It will be a matter of deep regret to Me, if the occurrences which have lately taken place in Italy should eventually lead to any interruption of tranquillity in that quarter; but it will, in such case, be My great object to secure to My people the continuance of peace.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The measures by which, in the last session of Parliament, you made provision for the expences of My Civil Government, and for the honour and

dignity of the Crown, demand My warmest acknowledgments.

I have directed that the estimates for the current year shall be laid before you, and it is a satisfaction to Me to have been enabled to make some reduction in Our military establishments.

You will observe from the accounts of the public revenue, that notwithstanding the receipts in Ireland have proved materially deficient, in consequence of the unfortunate circumstances which have affected the commercial credit of that part of the United Kingdom, and although Our foreign trade, during the early part of this time, was in a state of depression, the total revenue has nevertheless exceeded that of the preceding year.

A considerable part of this increase must be ascribed to the new taxes; but in some of those branches which are the surest indications of internal wealth, the augmentation has fully realized any expectation which could have been reasonably formed of it.

The separate provision which was made for the Queen, as Princess of Wales, in the year 1814, terminated with the demise of His late Majesty.

I have in the mean time directed advances, as authorised by law; and it will, under present circumstances, be for you to consider what new arrangements should be made on this subject.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I have great pleasure in being able to acquaint you, that a considerable improvement has taken place within the last half year in several of the most important branches of Our commerce and manufactures; and that in many of the manufacturing districts the distresses which prevailed at the

commencement of the last session of Parliament have greatly abated.

It will be My most anxious desire to concur in every measure which may be considered as calculated to advance Our internal prosperity.

I well know that, notwithstanding the agitations produced by temporary circumstances, and amidst the distress which still presses upon a large portion of My subjects, the firmest reliance may be placed on that affectionate and loyal attachment to My Person and Government, of which I have recently received so many testimonies from all parts of My kingdom, and which, whilst it is most grateful to the strongest feelings of My heart, I shall ever consider as the best and surest safeguard of My Throne.

In the discharge of the important duties imposed upon you, you will, I am confident, be sensible of the indispensable necessity of promoting and maintaining, to the utmost of your power, a due obedience to the laws, and of instilling into all classes of My subjects a respect for lawful authority, and for those established institutions, under which the Country has been enabled to overcome so many difficulties, and to which, under Providence, may be ascribed Our happiness and renown as a Nation.

THE following Addresses, having been transmitted to Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the several persons whose names are respectively subjoined to each Address, were presented by His Lordship to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful subjects, the Archbishop, the Dean and Chapter, the Archdeacon and the Clergy of the Diocese of Canterbury, approach your Majesty with sincere expressions of loyalty and attachment to your Person and Government.

As Protestants and subjects of the British empire, we are friends to the freedom of the press, to free and honest discussion in politics and religion: but, Sir, it is because we are friends to the freedom of the press that we deplore from the bottom of our hearts the licentiousness that prevails in it; scattering abroad with unsparing hand whatever is seditious, wicked and blasphemous: it is, Sir, by these means and by these means alone, so long as the constitutional Government of the country retains its strength and vigour, that the freedom of the press can be thrown into hazard.

In ordinary times, ordinary measures were found sufficient to put down these wild extravagances; they are not so now; your Majesty's legal Officers have not shrunk from their duty, the jurors wherever they have been called upon have done

that which was fit for them to do, and yet the mischief prevails in full force, asserting itself in bold and reiterated defiance to the existing laws of the land.

Nevertheless, Sir, we have full confidence in your Majesty's paternal Government, in your vigilance, firmness, and moderation; we have full confidence in the loyalty of the people at large, and lastly, we have full confidence in the wisdom and integrity of Parliament, to whom in their legislative capacity the protection of the Constitution, in Church and State, especially belongs.

We pray God to bless and protect your Majesty.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the undersigned Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, Freeholders and Inhabitant Householders of the County of Northampton, humbly approach your Majesty's Throne to express our sincere attachment to your Majesty's Person, our deep sense of the inestimable value of our Institutions, both in Church and State, and our fixed determination to defend and maintain them.

We have long noticed the mischievous efforts of faction to inflame and mislead the less enlightened part of the public, to detach the lower orders from their natural and beneficial dependance upon the other classes, and to persuade them that they have an adverse interest.

We lament to add that the blessing of a free press, which is the natural guardian of liberty, has been perverted to the advancement of its worst enemies, infidelity and anarchy.

We are convinced that the most effectual corrective of these great evils is to discountenance every attempt to render the passing political occurrences of the moment, the vehicles of sedition and treason; and we beg leave to express to your Majesty our decided opinion that, whatever minor differences may exist among the great body of the people, the feeling of loyalty to the Sovereign, and attachment to the Constitution is firmly rooted in their hearts.

We are confident that in proportion as the necessity of exertion shall be made apparent, the call will be answered by such an overwhelming majority of all that is estimable in character or in talents, in wealth or in station, as will give confidence to the loyal, and extinguish those revolutionary designs, to which invitations the most intelligible, and sometimes indeed the most direct, have been industriously circulated with impunity.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Jurats, and Commonalty of the Town of Faversham, in the County of Kent.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Jurats and Commonalty of the ancient

Town and Port of Faversham, beg leave to approach your Majesty with assurances of our inviolate attachment to your sacred Person, and of our firm determination to support the Constitution, in the true spirit of British loyalty to rally round and give our utmost support to the constituted Authorities in the full exercise and discharge of their legal functions, resolutely to defend the Monarchy, as well as the other branches of the Constitution, against the attempts openly and industriously made by the instigators and abettors of sedition and infidelity, and, finally, to transmit to posterity the blessings we have derived from the wisdom and bravery of our ancestors, which we have enjoyed under your Majesty's rightful and paternal sway.

But, Sire, while we thus express our sentiments of loyalty and attachment, we should be guilty of a gross dereliction of our duty did we not at the same time declare, with unfeigned regret, the unparalleled distress under which the country is now groaning; its commerce greatly decreased, its agriculture in a most depressed state, pauperism rapidly increasing to a most alarming extent, and all classes sinking under an almost insupportable weight of unprecedented taxation; and, while deploring these circumstances, we presume, with the profoundest respect, to recommend a most rigid economy in every department of the State, as a means of alleviating the burthens of the people, and rescuing this once happy nation, and our glorious Constitution, (the wonder and admiration of the world), from the evils with which it is surrounded, and to add our most fervent prayers to that Divine Being, whose ways are inscrutable, that your Majesty's reign may be long, happy, and prosperous in the affections of a faithful and loyal people.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's faithful and dutiful subjects, the undersigned Magistrates for the County of Suffolk, acting within the liberty of Bury Saint Edmunds, beg leave to renew to your Majesty the assurances of that warm respect and attachment with which we recently hailed your happy accession to the Throne of these realms.

We are urged to the discharge of this gratifying duty, at the present moment, by the deep concern we have felt at witnessing the blameable facility with which so many of our unsuspecting fellow countrymen have allowed their generous feelings to be perverted, by the efforts of those who, not seduced we fear by the influence of honest error, seem to exult in every period of public difficulty and distress as in a desired occasion for accomplishing their dangerous designs. These unhappy individuals, not content with having renounced for themselves the hopes and consolations of Christianity, and all submission to established Authorities, are apparently seeking, by the two fold instrumentality of blasphemy and sedition, to poison the most sacred sources of the public health, and thus to prepare their misguided followers for a full participation in their own fatal

and desperate purposes; and using the name of liberty, and even loyalty, as a cloak for their licentiousness, strike directly at the existence of the Throne, and of all those distinguishing civil and religious privileges of which we have been accustomed to regard the Crown as the proper ornament and the unfailing protector.

Convinced, Sire, of the value of those blessings, and grateful for the security and increase they have experienced under the beneficent sway of your Majesty's illustrious Family, we are anxious to transmit them to our latest posterity under the same auspicious guardianship.

With these feelings we venture humbly to tender to your Majesty this our solemn pledge that, by a firm administration of the laws, we will individually and collectively strive to preserve, unimpaired, your Majesty's constitutional Authority both in Church and State, and to aid your Majesty in realizing those ample claims upon public affection which you possess.

Entertaining the fullest confidence in your Majesty's paternal dispositions and in the unshaken fidelity of the nation at large, and, above all, relying upon the continued favour and protection of a gracious Providence, we indulge the pleasing anticipation that under the beloved Sceptre of the House of Brunswick, British loyalty, like the endowing principle of Kingly power, will "never die," and that throughout a prolonged reign your Majesty will largely experience the best earthly solace and recompence of a Sovereign's cares in augmenting the happiness and commanding the willing affection of a free and a grateful people.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects; the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Stirling, in a general meeting assembled, beg leave to approach your Royal Presence to renew the assurance of our attachment to your sacred Person and Government, and to the civil and religious institutions of our country.

In this we are satisfied, that we are not actuated by a blind zeal for a Constitution solely recommended to us by its being that of our ancestors; but that these sentiments are grounded on a fair and just appreciation of the benefits we derive from living under its protection, compared with that of any other State, either ancient or modern. In none of them have the personal liberty, property, and life of the subject been so jealously and so effectually guarded by the law, and no where has the administration of justice been so pure. It is therefore with mingled feelings of grief and indignation that we have noticed the industrious and mischievous dissemination of principles, alike subversive of the tenets of our holy religion, and destructive of those bands by which alone good order and a stable government can be maintained.

Deeply impressed with these sentiments, your Majesty may be assured of our faithfully discharging the duties of our respective situations, and of our inculcating and maintaining a due respect for the laws; and we trust that they will be found amply efficient for securing the tranquility of our country, and for transmitting, unimpaired, to the latest posterity, a Constitution which has hitherto been a blessing to those living under its protection, the envy of other nations, and the theme of admiration and praise among the wise and intelligent of all countries.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence has been pleased to nominate and appoint the Reverend George Simpson, of Glover-House, in the county of Kent, M. A. of Trinity College, Cambridge, and Vicar of Bobbing, in Kent, to be one of His Royal Highness's Domestic Chaplains.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the forty-third year of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting certain goods imported into Great Britain to be secured in warehouses without payment of duty," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the importer or importers, proprietor or proprietors, consignee or consignees, of any of the goods, wares, or merchandise, enumerated or described in the table thereunto annexed, marked (E), and which shall have been legally imported or brought into the port of London, to lodge and secure in a warehouse or warehouses to be provided for that purpose, any such goods, wares, or merchandise, under the joint locks of the crown and the merchant, without payment at the time of the first entry of the duties of customs due on the importation thereof: and it is by the said recited Act further enacted, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, or any three or more of them shall deem it expedient, that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to any goods, wares, and merchandise, not enumerated or described in either of the tables annexed thereto, and should cause a list of such goods, wares, and merchandises, to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions, of the said Act, shall extend to such goods, wares, and merchandise, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said tables respectively, at the time of passing the said Act:

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in execution of the powers vested in us, in and by the said Act, do hereby declare, that it appears to us expedient that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to the article of

Ground Madder,

legally imported or brought into the port of London (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies); and that such ground madder should be added to the list of goods, wares, and merchandise enumerated and described in the table annexed to the said recited Act, marked (E), and that such ground madder should be lodged and secured at or in such warehouse or warehouses, under the regulations and directions of the said Act: and we do further declare, that from and after the publication of this our certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the directions of the said Act, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions of the said Act shall extend, and be construed to extend, to all such ground madder in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the table annexed to the said Act, marked (E), at the time of the passing of the same Act.
