

and the Duke of *Holslein* in a way to an amicable Compromise. The said Duke is still here, and is like to remain here this Winter. General *Wedel* a Lieutenant-General *Giese* having had some difference, a Challenge thereupon passed between them, but the King of *Denmark* having had notice of it, caused General *Wedel*, who is in his Service, to be secured. The Elector of *Brandenburg* is building three new Men of War.

Hague, November 3. The Envoy from *Moscovy* is gone to *Saestdyke* to wait upon the Prince of *Orange*, who still continues there; but his Highness will return hither against the meeting of the States of *Holland*, who are to re-assemble the 15th of this Month. The Sieur *Campricht* the Imperial Minister continues his instances for the payment of the Arrears of Subsidies that are due to the Emperor from this State; and the States General have written to the Provinces of *Zealand*, *Friezland*, and *Groning* who have not yett payed their Quotas of the said Subsidies, to press them to pay the same, that satisfaction may be given to his Imperial Majesty. The Sieur *Pittecum* the Danish Envoy is upon his departure.

Brussels, November 3. We are impatiently expecting to hear what success Monsieur *Deval* has in his Negotiation at *Paris* concerning the prolongation of the Term set by the French King, which expires on the 22 Instant. Last night arrived here the Countess of *Soissons* with a great Train, whose presence will add much to the splendor of the Ball intended on the King's Birth-day. Our Letters from *Liege* inform us, That the Differences between their Prince and them continued in the posture they had for some time past been in; and that there could not any Judgment be made of the disposition his Electoral Highness has to an Accommodation, till the Bishop of *Strasbourg* arrives at *Cologne*, who seems to be intrusted with the chief managements of his Electoral Highnesses publick Affairs. Our Letters from *Vienna* speak of the ill posture of things in *Hungary*; they say, the Imperial Generals complain, that they have not forces enough to act against the Enemy, and that the Army there is, wants the Provisions it ought to have been furnished with; That the *Bassa of Newberst* is in the Field with a Body of 14 or 15000 Men, and that it's believed his design is, to attack *Lewentz*; and that the general opinion is, that Count *Teckley's* aim in sending his Deputies to *Vienna* was rather to amuse that Court, than to dispose things to a Peace.

Portsmouth, October 29. On Thursday in the Afternoon came into this Harbour from the Downs, the Kings-Fishes Captain, *Wheeler* Commander.

London, October 30. This day Sir *William Prichard* Knight, Lord Mayor of this City, was Sworn before the Barons of the Exchequer at *Westminster*, whither he went by Water accompanied by the Lord Mayor, the Aldermen and Sheriffs, and attended by the several Companies in their respective Burgess, adorned in the usual manner; their Majesties and his Royal Highness being pleased to do them the Honour to be upon the Leads at *Whitehall* when they passed by. Being come back they passed with the usual Solemnity amidst the repeated Acclamations of the People to *Grocers-Hall*, where a very noble and splendid Dinner was provided, at which were the Lords of his Majesties Privy Coun-

cil, with many others of the Nobility, the Judges and other Persons of Quality.

Westminster, O ober 31. This day a Trial was had at the Kings-Bench upon an Indictment of *Edward Whitaker* for Scandalous and Scatious Words by him spoken at *Leith*, which being proved by Three very substantial Witnesses, and neither the said *Whitaker*, nor any body for him appearing, the Jury, without stirring from the Bar, found him Guilty of the said Indictment.
