

IN obedience to an order of the Court of Lord Mayor and Aldermen, dated the 29th day of September 1821, made in pursuance of an Act of Parliament, passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for completing a bridge across the River Thames, from Blackfriars, in the City of London, to the opposite side, in the County of Surrey, and for other purposes therein mentioned;" and of a certain other Act of Parliament made and passed in the fifty-second year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for increasing the Fund for watching, lighting, cleansing, watering, and repairing Blackfriars'-Bridge;" I do hereby give notice, that between the hours of ten o'clock in the forenoon and two of the clock in the afternoon, on the 29th day of March next ensuing, at my Office of Chamberlain of the City of London, in Guildhall, London, the principal sums of money, together with all interest due on the said 29th day of March next ensuing, upon the undermentioned bonds, being part of the sum of £156,000, raised by the authority of the aforesaid Act of 7 Geo. 3, under the common seal of this City, and made payable to William Montague, his executors, administrators, or assigns (by indorsement), will then be paid off, at my said Office at Guildhall, to the several and respective person or persons respectively entitled to receive the same; and that from thenceforth the interest on the said bonds will cease and determine.
