... PROCLAMATION
... GEORGE R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued unto Thursday the third day of January next; We, with the advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, in the said third day of January next, to Tuesday the sixth day of February next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor that a part of Our aforesaid Kingdom called Great Britain, do prepare commissions for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall on the said sixth day of February next be held, and set forth the dispatch of all such urgent and important business. And the Judges, Serjeants at Law, and the Knights, Barons, and Burgesses, and the Commons in Parliament assembled, do hereby request and command, to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said sixth day of February next.

AND the Right Honourable the Lord High Treasurer of Great Britain, the tenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one, did certify the second year of the Majesty of our said Majesty King George the Fourth, that the said Parliament was held at Westminster, on the said sixth day of February next, and that the said Parliament was dissolved on the said sixth day of February next.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 14th of November 1821,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the fifth of May last, for prohibiting the exportation of gun-powder, arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant November; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth day of this instant November), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place within the dominions of the King of Spain, or to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Straights of Gibraltar), or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gun-powder
