To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Commonalty of the City of Coventry, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, in Council assembled, impressed with sentiments of the deepest veneration and regard, humbly beg leave to approach the Throne, and offer to your Majesty our very sincere and ardent congratulations on your Majesty's return from your late visits to your Majesty's loyal and affectionate subjects in Ireland and Hanover, which happy event we attribute to the special protection of Divine Providence, in a season of so much peril, and which has proved so awfully calamitous to many of your Majesty's loyal and attached subjects.

Whilst congratulating your Majesty on the return to your native shore, we beg to assure your Majesty of our unabated allegiance; and that it is our most earnest prayer, your Majesty's valuable life may long be spared as a blessing to a loyal, free, and happy people.

We have to congratulate your Majesty on your safe return from your visit to your Irish and Continental dominions, where, it gives us the most sincere pleasure, your Majesty was received with every demonstration of love, esteem, and regard. We encourage the hope, that your Majesty may be pleased to favour Scotland with an early visit, where we anticipate corresponding pleasure will be afforded to your Majesty, and gratification to your subjects.

In conclusion, allow us to express our most sincere wish, that the British empire may long experience, in the sacred person of your Majesty, the inestimable blessing of a Monarch, reigning in the hearts of an affectionate, happy, and free people.
