or offenders, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said offence, viz.

TWENTY GUINEAS, to be paid by the said Mr. Beaumont, and

THIRTY GUINEAS, by the Treasurer of the Nottinghamshire Association for the Prosecution of Felons.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented unto the King, that about twelve o'clock in the night of Monday the 3d of December instant, some person or persons did wilfully and feloniously set fire to three stacks of hay and one stack of straw, standing in a paddock near the town of Alford, in the county of Lincoln, the property of Mr. Henry Wilson, Solicitor, of Alford; and that about the same hour of the night of Saturday the 8th instant, some person or persons did also wilfully and maliciously set fire to nine stacks, consisting of hay, corn, clover, and straw, standing in the farm yard of Mr. Richard Braim, of Alford aforesaid;

His Majesty for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felonies above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise. His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person or persons who actually set fire to the said stacks, in either of the instances above-mentioned), who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

SIDMOUTH.

And as a further encouragement a reward of TWENTY GUINEAS is hereby offered by the said Henry Wilson, and a further reward of THIRTY GUINEAS by the parish of Alford aforesaid, to any person (except as aforesaid), who shall discover the offender or offenders in the first mentioned offence; and a reward of FIFTY GUINEAS is also hereby offered by the said parish of Alford, to any person (except as aforesaid), who shall discover the offender or offenders in the last mentioned offence, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of either of the offences above-mentioned.—The said rewards to be paid on conviction by the said Henry Wilson, of Alford aforesaid.

HEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the forty-third year of the reign of His Late Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting certain goods imported into Great Britain to be secured in warehouses without payment of duty," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the importer or importers, proprietor or proprietors, consignee or consignees, of any of the goods, wares, or merchandise, enumerated or described in the table thereunto annexed, marked (E), and which shall have been legally imported or brought into the port of London, to lodge and secure in a warehouse or warehouses to be provided for that purpose, any such goods,

wares; or merchandise, under the joint locks of the crown and the merchant, without payment at the time of the first entry of the duties of customs, due on the importation thereof: and it is by the said recited Act further enacted, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, or any three or more of them shall deem it expedient, that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to any. goods, wares, and merchandise, not enumerated or described in either of the tables annexed thereto, and should cause a list of such goods, wares, and merchandises, to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions, of the said Act, shall extend to such goods, wares, and merchandise, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said tables respectively, at the time of passing the said Act:

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in execution of the powers vested in us, in and by the said Act, do hereby declare, that it appears to us expedient that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to the articles of

Pigs' Chaps, Pigs' Faces, and German Sausages, legally imported or brought into the port of London (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies); and that such pigs' chaps, pigs' faces, and German sausages should be added to the list of goods, wares, and merchandise enumerated and described in the table annexed to the said recited Act, marked (E), and that such pigs' chaps, pigs' faces, and German sausages should be lodged and secured at or in such warehouse or warehouses, under the regulations and directions of the said Act: and we do further declare, that from and after the publication of this our certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the directions of the said Act, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions of the said Act shall extend, and be construed to extend, to all such pigs' chaps, pigs' faces, and German sausages, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the table annexed to the said Act, marked (E), at the time of the passing of the same Act.
