

Greitzki, which they say they are satisfied his Electoral Highness has done with a good intention, viz. to facilitate an accommodation of the differences that have so long depended between their Princes and them, and therefore they hope this State will not have any jealousy of this proceeding: The States-General have put this Letter into the hands of their Deputies for Foreign Affairs. The said States, among other matters, have now before them that concerning the sending an Extraordinary Ambassador to the most Christian King, about the War of *Orange*. From *Vienne* of the 22nd inst, they write, That Count *Tecceley's* Deputies had declared, That their Majesty could not Treat of a Peace without the consent of the Pope; and that it was said the Emperor intended to go in the Spring to *Rainbonne*, to pass some time there. We are informed, That by the late Alliance concluded between the King of *Denmark*, the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the Bishop of *Munster*, those Princes have obliged themselves to employ their utmost endeavours for the establishing at this time a firm Peace between the Empire and the Crown of *France*, and in order hereunto, to do what in them lies to dispose the Emperor and the Princes of the Empire to accept of the Proposals which were made many Months since by the French Ambassadors at *Francfort*: And it's said that the Electors of *Metz* and *Cologne*, and the Elector Palatine, will likewise come into this Alliance.

Paris, Dec. 4. From *Rome* we have advice, That the Abbot *Favoriti* did there the 13th past: He was lookt upon as a great Fomentor of the differences between this Crown and the Pope, with whom he was in great credit. The King has sent the Marquis *de Bebhane* for *Poland*, and it's said he has taken Bills of Exchange with him for very considerable Sums of Money. The King has prolonged the Term which he had given the Crown of *Spain* to declare it self in, till the 15th of *January*.
