By the Commissinners for execuling the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, \&

WHereas-by His late Majesty's Royal Proclamation, bearing date the 1st day of January $180 \%$, and by divers Statutes trow in force, His Majesty's subjects are prohibited from hoisting, Catidying, or weating in any of their ships or yessels, Whis Majesty's Jack, cominonly"called the Uhion Jaç, ont any pendants; or any such colours as are wisually worn by His Majesty's slips, without partičular warrant for their so domg from His Majesty, or His High Admiral of Greai Britaiof or the Commissioners for execiiting the Office of Higlr Admirat - for the time heing:

And whereas' it has been' represented to us that Wthe Union Juck hoisted at the top-mast head for fore-top-minst lieat of vessels having more than one mast), is a geueral and well understood signal for a pilot, which it wonld be inexpedient at presens to alter:
We do therefore, by virtue of the power and authority vested in us, hereby warrant and anthorize all His Majesty's subjects to boist the Uniou Jack at the top-mast-head of their ships or vessels where there is but one mast, or at the fore-cop-mast-bead where there are more than one mast, sas"a signal for a pilot; but strictly probiliting the wearing or hoisting the suill Jack for any wher purpose whatsouer, or longer than is necessary for the procuring a pilot:
And whereas the priper flags, which by the said Proclamation the ships and vessels of His Majestys subjects are authorized to wear, are not sufficient to enable then to make signals without the addition of some other colurs;
We do further warrant and authorize all His Majesty's subjects to hoist on boand their ships and vessels, by way of signel only, any colors (except pendants and the Union Jack), provided such colors shall not be buisted in the place where similar colours are usually worn in His Majesty's ships and vessels :
And whereas it has been represented to us that certain signals have been heretofore established and agreed upon, and are now in use amongst His Majesty's subjects, wherein pendants and the Union Jack are employeil, and that it would be inexpedient to probibit' the ise of the said siguals, until reasonable time for substitutiug some other idescription of colors in lieu of pendants and the Usion Jack be allowed;
$\because$ We do further warrant ana authorise all His

Majesty's subjeots to hoist aniture, for sighats only, pendants and the Unini Jack, until the list of Jamiary 1824 and wo longer ; upon and after whicly day no pendint is under any pretence whatsoever to he hoisted in the ships onsessels of any of His Majesty's subjects, nor the Union Jack, except only, as before provided, as the signal for a pilot.

Royal Harbout of Ramsfafe December 4, 1822.

AT a General Meeting of the Trusteey for caprying into execution the several Acts of Patliament, respectively made in the thirty-second, thirty-seventh, and fifty-fith years of the reigis of His late Majesty George the Third, relating to the Harbour of Ransigate, lietd thits day, in pursuance of a notice in the London Gazette, dated the J'6th day of November now last past, for the purpose of taking into cousideration tice expediency of altering and varying the several rates or duties directed and authorised to be raisets and levied by the said several Acts of Parliament, in. respect to every ship, vessel, or crayer, British as well as foreign, whether the same be laden or in ballast, passing to or by Ramsgate, whether on the east or west side of the Goodwin Sands, or otherwise passing to or by the said Harbour of Ramsgate; at which Meeting fitteen or more of the said Thustees dyere prea sent, and the Report from the Select Committee of the House of Commons on the Foreign Trade of the Country, made on the 23d day of July last, having, so far us the same relates to the Royal Harbour of-Ramsgate, been read and taken into due consideration, and it having been tully considered how lat the suggestions of the said Committex, with respect to the said Harbour, can, with due regard to the safety and maintenance of the said Harbour in a proper state and condition, and with regard also to the provisions of the several Aets of Parliament above referred to, be complied "ith;

It was resolved unanimously,
That the several rates and duties now existing and payable under or by virtue of the said Acts of Parlianent, of the thirty-second and fifty-fifth vears of the reing of His late Majesty George the ithird, shall be vapied and altered; and that the followving rates and duties shall be imposed and be payable by virtue of the said Acts (chat is to say), two pence per ton to be paid by the masters or owners, for every ship, vessel, or crayer, British as well as foreign, of the burthen of 20 . tons. or upwards, and sot exceeding the burthem of 300 tons; and for every ship, vessel, or crayer, British as well as forejgn, which shall exceed the burthen of 300 tons, a rate or duty of one halfpening for cach ton of such slipp, vessel, or crayer (except
