

bimay, Governor of Luxemburg, will remain here  
 et some days. Our Letters from Luxemburg of  
 the 10th Instant tell us, That the French had forbid  
 the Country People to carry any Corn to that  
 City. The Conditions on which the Customs are  
 to be let to farm were published yesterday, but  
 there being a new Tariff or Book of Rates under  
 Consideration, they will not proceed upon the  
 said Farm till that be settled. The Marquis de  
 Richelieu and Madamoiselle Mazarine, have been  
 Married at Liere in this Province, and have taken a  
 House there. Great preparations are making here  
 for the keeping the Feast of St. Anthony on the 17  
 Instant.

Paris, January 16. The Affairs between this Court and that  
 of Rome, continue to be very much embroiled. The Arch-  
 bishop of this City having, by the Kings order, appointed  
 the Sieur Pirox to visit all the Monasteries and other Commu-  
 nities, in this Kingdom, where any Divinity-Schools are kept,  
 and to require the Professors to teach in the said Schools  
 the Propositions of the Clergy in their last Assembly, Some  
 have declared, That they cannot meddle with a matter of  
 that importance, at least, till they themselves are better  
 instructed therein than yet they are. The Letters we receive  
 from Rome tell us, That the Pope had refused his Bulls to  
 the Abbot Savary, whom the King has lately promoted to a  
 Bishoprick; and that there is very small appearance of the  
 Cardinal d'Estrees succeeding in his Negotiation there.  
 We formerly gave you an account of the arrival of Don  
 Carlos Antonio del Castillio, whom the King of Spain sent  
 to perform his Compliments at this Court upon the Birth of  
 the Duke of Burgundy, and that meeting with difficulties  
 upon the Orders he had to decline giving this young Prince  
 the Title of Duke of Burgundy, he had sent a Courier to  
 Spain; and now we can tell you, that having received Di-  
 rections from Madrid thereupon, he demanded his Audiences  
 of the King, Queen, &c. to which he was Conducted the 9th  
 Instant.

Whitehall, January 10. This day Sir Charles Little-  
 ton, Sir Richard How, Colonel Beebon, and other  
 Considerable Planters and Merchants of Jamaica,  
 delivered to the Right Honourable the Lords  
 of the Committee for Trade and Foreign Plantations,  
 the following Address to his Majesty from that  
 Island, which their Lordships afterwards presented  
 to his Majesty. who being Attended by Sir Charles  
 Littleton, and the other Gentlemen of his Bed-  
 chamber, was Graciously pleased to assure them,  
 That he was very well satisfied with this Address,  
 and the Dutiful Acknowledgments of his Subjects in  
 Jamaica, and that he was resolved to be very kind  
 to them.

His Majesties Council, and the Gentlemen of the  
 Assembly for His Island of Jamaica, being met  
 at St. Jago de la Vega the 21 day of September  
 1682. by order of his Excellency the Go-  
 vernor, Sir Thomas Lynch, humbly beseech the  
 Lord President, and Lords of His Majesties  
 most Honourable Privy Council for Govern-  
 ing His Majesties Foreign Plantations, to pre-  
 sent to His Most Sacred Majesty this their most  
 Humble Address and Petition.

May it please Your Majesty.

Having received more frequent Testimonies of  
 Your Royal Grace and Bounty than others of  
 Your Subjects, we ought to have been the first to have  
 made Profession of our Loyalty, Duty, and Gratitude  
 to Your Sacred Majesty, but the unsettledness of our  
 Affairs, and that vast distance we are at from Your  
 Kingdom of England, may move Your Majesty (the  
 best and most gracious of Kings) to pardon the Omis-  
 sion, and accept a late, but hearty and humble tender  
 of our Duty.

Dread SIR,

We do (as we have the greatest reason in the World  
 for it) bless God, and most humbly thank Your Majesty  
 for Your Care in Protecting us, for Your Grace and  
 Justice in Assimilating our Government so that of our  
 Native Country of England; for Your Majesties fa-  
 vouring us with an Order for supply of Negroes at  
 reasonable Rates, and for those many repeated Acts of  
 Grace, Justice, Bounty and Protection, which Your  
 Majesty hath been pleas'd to confer upon us, and this  
 Your great and flourishing Colony.

SIR,

To evidence in some measure our Thankfulness and  
 Duty, we most humbly present to Your Majesty an Act of  
 Revenue, formed by Advice of our present Governor,  
 which, with our former Body of Laws, we hope, quadrates  
 with those Orders and Directions, the Lords of Your  
 Majesties Privy Council sent hither. We prostrate  
 them and our selves at Your Majesties Royal Feet, humbly  
 beseeching Your Majesty will be graciously pleas'd to pass  
 them, considering how much the Establishing of known  
 Laws will contribute to the satisfaction of Your Sub-  
 jects, and prosperity of this Your Majesties Colony.

Dread Sovereign,

Although we are the remotest of all Your Subjects  
 from Your Royal Throne, yet have we (so our great  
 trouble) understood, there may have been designs to  
 subvert and shake it, and that some would have impos'd  
 on Your Majesty, others altered the Succession, and ex-  
 cluded Your Royal Brother, and in order to that (or  
 worse ends) would have entred into Seditious Affo-  
 ciations, all which we utterly detest, and humbly beseech  
 Your Majesty so believe, that we shall always obey Your  
 Commands, dutifully revere Your Person, and faith-  
 fully support Your Majesties Government and Lawful  
 Succession, to the utmost of our power; The long and  
 happy continuance whereof, both in Church and State,  
 we heartily pray for.
