And, as a further encouragement, a reward of **FIFTY POUNDS** is hereby offered by the said Lord Stowell to any person (except as aforesaid) who shall discover the offender or offenders in each of the above mentioned offences, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

**MY LORDS,**

**WE** respectfully submit, for your Lordships' approbation, the following scheme for the second lottery 1822, consisting of 14,000 tickets; the first 5000 tickets, viz. Nos. 1 to Nos. 5000, to be drawn singly on the 9th of April 1823; and the last 9000 tickets, viz. Nos. 5001 to Nos. 14,000, to be drawn in two classes, on the 23d April and 8th May 1823; No. 5001 to No. 9500, to form the first class, and Nos. 9501 to 14,000, the second class; the drawing of No. 5001 to decide No. 9501, and so on in numerical progression.
