Vienna, Jap. 10. Wo days fince arrived here the Count ite Supenara, who has for lome time refid d, by the Emperors order, with Count ZeckNey; and yesterday arrived two: Exploses from Hungary, we cannot learn what they brought, farther than that in the general they give an account of the great preparations of the Turks, and that Count Teckeley has to far engaged himfelf with they that h can-not hearken to any Propolals that are made from hence, for his separate Accommodation. The 8th Inftant 1000 Horle marched in two Bodies under the Command of the Baron de Borfchird, and the Count of sallaburg, towards the Waag, where they are to quarter to burder the incursions of the Turks; and another Party of Horfe and Dragoons is ordered to march to the Berg-Towns to cover the Miners. There is now no more dilcourfe of the Emperors Journey to Ratubone; but it is faid, that his Imperial Majefty will fend the Prince of Swartzenburg thither, to impirt to the States of the Empire Al-tembled there, his Imperial Majulties thoughts up-ten the prefent flate of Affairs. Francfort, Jan. 19. On Friday last parted from hence the Count de Rosenberg, one of the Imperial Ambassiadors for Genna; and to Morrow his Colleague, Monseur Braeman, likewile leaves this place, and takes his Journey for Ratisbonne. The Prince of Waldecke has been here, and has pressed these Magistrates to enter into the League concluded between the Emperor and the Circle of Franconia, but they seem not at all inclined thereunto, defiring rather to maintain a Neutrality. From Ratisbonne the Write, That not only the Electoral Colledge, but likewise thole of the Princes, and the Imperial Towns have resolved to Treat with Monssen Ferjus, the French Minister there; And from Fienna we have an account, That the Emperor wassending the Prince of Smartzenburg to Raisbonne, to negotiate matters on his Imperial Magesties behalf.

Cologne, Fan. 22. The Affairs of this City are in much diforder, through the frequent Difputes that arife between the Magistrates and the Burghers; the latter are now allembled in their feveral Halls, and have drawn up a Paper containing a great many Articles, which they pretend to have fatisfaction in, and have delivered it to the Magistrates, with a demand of a speedy and positive Answer. The Deputies of Liege begin to speak of returning home, The finding they are not able to do any good here. Our Letters from Rainbonne of the 12 Inflant, give us an account, That the Bishop of Aichitadt, the Emperrors Commiffioner, having communicated to the Dyet an Imperial Decree of the 29 of December, wherein his Imperial Majelty does, among other things, declare, how deficous he is that the Differences that are depending between the Empire and the Crown of France may be amicably composed, and that he is willing a Negotiation should be entred into with Monfieur Verjus, the French Minister at Ratiobonne for that purpole; The leveral Colledges had thereupon refolved to begin a Treaty with the faid Minilter accordingly.
