

refuses between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Holstein, will be accepted; which we shall be glad to hear with more certainty.

Hague, Jan. 12. The Deputies of Holland, which were old you in our last, were gone home to consult their Principals, being returned, the States of Holland were again completely Assembled the 20 Instant, the Prince of Orange being present in their Assembly. The same day in the Afternoon the States General met extraordinarily, and were together till late in the Evening; having sent a very considerable Deputation to the French Ambassador, who had a long Conference with his Excellency at his Request, of which they made Report to the States the next Morning. The Baron de Munniken, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Saxony, has had his Audience of the States General, and they have appointed Commissioners to treat with him. At Amsterdam, at Rotterdam, in Zealand, and North Holland, the Admirals do all they can to hasten the building of their Quotas of the 35 Men of War which the States General resolved some time since to build, and allowed two years for the doing it; but the States of Friesland have not yet undertaken their part of these Ships, concerning which they continue to make several difficulties.

Hague, Jan. 16. The States of Holland are Adjourned to the 9th of the next Month, and the Deputies of the several Towns are thereupon gone home. It is said that the States General have, by their Deputies, complained to the French Ambassador concerning the Ship that was some time since seized by the French Men of War in the Road of Alicante, being hoisted under Dutch Colours for Argiers. We do not yet hear that the States have finished the matter of the Equipage of 24 Men of War, and some begin to think that there will be nothing done first, because of the disposition there seems to be every where to Peace. The Heer Van Odyke is gone for Zealand, to be present in the Assembly of the States of that Province.

Paris, Jan. 27. The last week there was a general Review of the Troops of the Kings Household, at which his Majesty was present. It is said that the Kings Journey to *Compeigne* will be sooner than was expected. This Court seems not very well satisfied with the Imprisonment of the Marquis de Pianezza, and it is said that the King has taken him into his Protection, and that he has written to the Duke and Duchess of Savoy on his behalf. The Venetian Ambassador having complained to the King of some Disorders that have been lately committed at Venice by the Servants of the French Ambassador there, his Majesty has sent Orders to the Sieur Amelot, his said Ambassador, to give the Senate all the satisfaction they desire in this matter, and to put out of his Family the Gentleman of his Horse, and such others as were concerned in the said Disorders. We are told that there is a Treaty on foot between the King and the Duke of Mecklenburg, and that his Majesty, in case the same have effect, is to give the said Duke an Annual Pension of 500 thousand Livres, besides a considerable Sum of Monys in hand. It is said the Kings Forces, that are to be in the Field this Summer, will be divided in several small Camps, for their more commodious subsisting, and if there be occasion they may quickly be drawn together. We have an account, that the Marquis de Flammarin, who many years ago was engaged in a Duell,

which obliged him to quit this Kingdom and to live abroad, has been lately taken at a House he has not far from *Boyrdeaux*; having been accidentally discovered, and that he is now a Prisoner, and it is thought it may cost him his Life.

Windfor, Jan. 18. Yesterday morning the Right Honourable the Earl of Arundel, Constable and Governor of His Majesties Royal Castle and Honour of Windfor, and Lord Warden of the Forest, came hither to take possession of his Government, having been met at the bounds of the County by several Noblemen, the High Sheriff, and many Persons of Quality, who accompanied his Lordship hither; At the Cross, the Mayor with the Aldermen and the Principal Inhabitants of the Burrough received his Lordship, and in a Speech expressed their great satisfaction in that His Majesty had been pleased to confer these Places of great Honour and Trust on a Person of so Antient and Noble Extraction, and known Loyalty; and acquainted his Lordship that as a testimony of their Respect, they had chosen him to be their High Steward: his Lordship received them his Thanks, and assured them of his readiness to do them all the good Offices that might lie in his power, which he did not doubt, but they would make themselves capable of by their Loyalty to His Majesty; and then invited the Mayor and all the Company to Dinner, who were very nobly Entertained in the Round Tower. This Morning his Lordship, after having been at Prayers at St. George's Chappel, was met at the Gate of the Castle by the Mayor and Corporation in their Formalities, and Conducted to their Guild Hall, where the Mayor presented to his Lordship the Instrument of the Office of High Steward, and then gave his Lordship a very handsome Entertainment in their Council-Chamber, which was accompanied with all the Demonstrations of Loyalty to His Majesty, and respect to his Lordship.
