

Whitehall, May 12, 1823.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to His Majesty, that, about twelve o'clock at noon on Tuesday the 6th day of May instant, some person or persons unknown did unlawfully and maliciously set fire to a certain plantation of fir trees, the property of James Lawrell, Esq. situate in the hamlet of Frimley, in the hundred of Godley, in the county of Surrey, whereby about four hundred acres of the said plantation were burnt, and the fir trees therein growing were destroyed;

His Majesty, for the better discovering, apprehending, and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the said outrage, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person or persons who actually set fire to the said plantation), who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of FIFTY POUNDS is hereby offered to any person (except as is before excepted) who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof; or to any person or persons who shall give such information to the said James Lawrell as shall lead to the conviction of any of the offenders; such reward to be paid by the said James Lawrell on such conviction.
