

Commissary *Hes*, whom the States sent to Argiers to deliver to them the Cannon and Ammunition they were obliged by their late Treaty to furnish them, and to redeem the Dutch Slaves, has had no very good treatment there, and the Sieur Hellenberg, our Consul at Argiers, who lately arrived here with Letters from the *Divan*, is unwilling to return thither; for that he looks upon that Government not to be at all inclined to maintain the Peace with this State. The Prince of Orange is returned from Dieren.

Paris, Feb. 9. According to the common discourse at Court the Kings Journey for Compeigne is deferred, and the Dauphin is to command an Army of 40 or 50 thousand Men. The Marquis de Crecy, eldest Son to the Maréchal of that name, is married to the Daughter of the Duke d'Almont. The Doctors of the Sorbonne have not as yet refuted their Answer to the Proposition they lately received from the Parliament, which, for that it is a very nice Subject, is expected with much impatience and curiosity. From Rome they write, that the Pope is endeavouring to raise a Sum of Money for the assistance of the Emperor against the Turks; and that the affairs between that Court and this continue in much the same posture, and without any likelihood of their being suddenly composed.

Paris, Feb. 13. We begin to talk here of the March of the French Troops, which it's said are to be at their Rendezvous the beginning of the next month. The Dauphin will command the Army, and the Prince of Conde under him. Orders are sent to Toulon for the fitting out several Men of War which are to be employed against the Algerines, whom in the mean time give great disturbance to our Navigation and Commerce. There are great solicitations in favour of Monsieur Flammarin.

Westminster, Feb. 4. The Justices of the Peace for the City and Liberty of Westminster, and Petty Sessions, held the first of this instant February, made the following Order, 13 Justices being present.

To the respective High Constables, and all Petty Constables whom these may concern.

Whereas frequent Complaints have been made unto us, That the Streets of this place are by reason of the fitting of Hackney-Coches inservable for Hire, become oftentimes unpassable, to the common方便 of the Inhabitants, of other His Majesties Subjects in their lawful Trades and Occasions. Whereas His Majesty in Council taking Notice thereof, hath by His Right Honourable the Lord-Keeper and his Officers His Majeсть unto us, that the Nuisance aforesaid be removed, and for the future prevented; and especially that no Hackney-Coach shall stand before Whitehall, the New-Exchange in the Strand, or Temple-Bar, within the Liberties of Westminster. These are therefore in His Majesties Name to Will and Require you to see and appoint Constables, with sufficient Officers, every day to attend at the respective places aforesaid, and not permit any Hackney-Coach to stand for Hire in King-Street, Westminster, nor between the Gate over against Scotland-Yard, and the Thorne-Yard Tavern at Charing-Cross, nor between Saffron-House and the end of George-Street in the Strand, nor between Temple-Bar and Norton-Fair in the Parish of St. Clement-Danes. And in case any of your Petty-Constables shall find any Hackney-Coach

so standing, after Notice from you to remove, that then you apprehend all and every the Coachmen, driving the said Hackney Coaches, to bring them before us, or some one of His Majesties Justices of the Peace for the said County, or City and Liberties of Westminster aforesaid, to be dealt with according to Law for the said Nuisance. And you are further required to give an exact account in Writing of your Proceedings herein at our Petty-Sessions, upon what purpose you have service, and the clearing of the Streets, every Thursday evening of the Clock in the Forenoon, at the Vestry of St. Martin in the Fields, as you will answer the contrary at your Perils.
