And also to command, that such His Majesty's royal concession and declaration be recorded in His Majesty's College of Arms.

The drawback of all the duties paid on the importation thereof, is to be allowed in respect of ashes and barilla used and consumed in bleaching linen in Great Britain, in the like manner, and under the same regulations as when imported into Ireland and there used in the bleaching of linen, agreeably to Act of the 54th Geo. 3d, cap. 129.

Drawback to be allowed on deals used in the mines in the counties of Cornwall and Devon: Drawback,

The above drawback to be allowed on deals used in any mines in Great Britain, in like manner with deals used in mines in Ireland, under the laws in force, being above seven inches in width, and being eight feet in length, and not above ten feet in length, and not exceeding one and a half inches in thickness.

Bounty on linen exported from Ireland to certain places, to be paid on such linen exported to the East Indies, as in Great Britain, -under the laws in force.

No bounty to be allowed on any linen exported from Ireland, unless the same is of the breadth of twenty-five inches and upwards, in like manner as in Great Britain, under the laws in force.

The bounty payable in Ireland, of 14d. per square yard, on diaper, buckaback, and sheeting, not to be paid unless such goods exceed the value of one shilling and six pence the running yard, in like manner as in Great Britain, under the laws in force.
