And it hath also been humbly represented unto the King, that, on Tuesday the 2d day of November instant, the body of Mary Ann Hattenborough, a girl of the age of eight years (who had been missing for eight days), was found in a pond adjoining Maud Foster's Drain, in Boston aforesaid; and that there is strong reason to believe, that the said Mary Ann Hattenborough was murdered, previously to her being thrown into the said pond;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the person or persons concerned in each of the above atrocious murders,

is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person or persons who actually committed either of the said murders) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
