WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," it is amongst other churches in populous parishes," it is amongst other things enacted, that in any case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into complete, separate, and distinct parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, but that it is expedient to divide the saine into such ecclesiastical district saine into such ecclesiastical districts are divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts, as they with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches and chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient, for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels, to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective charches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendance of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral liabits of the persons residing therein, the sail Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described, and if thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law, for the purpose of effecting such division :

And whereas a representation has been made by the said Commissioners to His Majesty in Council, stating that in the month of November 1818, a petition of the Ministers in behalf of the inhabitants of the parish of Saint Giles, Camberwell, in the county of Surrey, and diocese of Winchester, was presented to the said Commissioners, and that amongst other things the said petition set forth that the parish of St. Giles, Camberwell, is a large and populous parish, containing in circumference nearly twenty-two miles, with a population of about sixteen thousand persons; that the parish is divided into three hamlets, or liberties, viz. Camberwell, Peckham, and Dulwich; that the spiritual wants of the inhabitants of the latter district or liberty; which is the smallest of the three, are proi vided for by the chapel at Dulwich College, that the district of Peckham is the next in extent and ...population,...und..where a chapel has lately been erected on the principals of the established Church; a that the district or liberty of Camberwell is by far the largest sin extent and population, containing noteless than eights thousand souls, and affording comparatively the smallest church accomodaparish thurch will not accommodate more than one thousand three hundred persons, and the parish church and consecrated chapels within the parish

will not accommodate more than one thousand eight hundred persons; that the said Commis-sioners having taken the petition and all the circumstances of the parish, with reference to its spiritual wants, into consideration, deemed it expedient, for the accommodation of a very large and populous portion of the district of Camberwell, which lies at a considerable distance from the parish church, that a new church should be erected therein capable of accommodating nine hundred and seventy-six persons in pews, and seven hundred and fifty-eight poor persons in free seats; that the church has since been so erected according to a plan and estimate approved by the said Commissioners, and the same has been consecrated; that the said Commissioners have granted, in His Majesty's name, out of the Parliamentary Fund, the sum of five thousand pounds towards the expence of erecting such church, and the parish agreed to defray the remainder of the expence, and to provide the site: That it has since been represented to the said Commissioners, that in consequence of the large population of that part of the parish in which the church has been built, and the distance at which a considerable proportion of the inhabitants reside from the parish church, it would be highly advantageous if a part of the parish was divided into an ecclesiastical district, under the provisions of the twenty-first and twenty-second section of the Act of Parliament abovementioned; that the said Commissioners having taken the said representation into consideration, are of opinion that it will be expedient so to divide the parish. for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine worship, according to the rites and ceremonies of the United Charch of England and Ireland, to persons residing within the proposed district, and for enabling the spiritual person who may serve the new church to perform all eccleslastical duties which may attach thereto, and for the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the inhabitants; and the said Commissioners accordingly caused a map, shewing the proposed line of division, to be laid before them, and having approved of the same, they applied to the Lord Bishop of the diocese for his consent, which His Lordship has signified under his hand and seal, as required by the said Act: And the Commissioners beg leave, therefore, to lay before His Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and a map (which is hereunto annexed), in which the proposed division is coloured red; and humbly pray, that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into His Royal consideration, and make such order in respect thereto as His Majesty in His wisdom shall seem meet: His Majesty having taken the said representation of the said Commissioners into consideration is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

A Description of the District attached to the Church of Saint George, in the parish of Saint Giles, Camberwell, in the county of Surrey, as

ascertained in pursuance of the Statute fiftyeighth George the Third, chapter forty-five, and of His Majesty's Order in Council of the 19th of October 1824.

Commencing at a point A, in Bowyer-lane, at the inuction of Camberwell and Lamberh parishes, and proceeding thence in a straight line one thousand seven hundred and fifty links through the centre of the east end of Bowyer-lane to the middle of the high road leading from Camberwell to London at B; from thence along the middle of the said high road leading from Camberwelt to London two hundred links in a straight line to a point C in the said road, opposite the middle of Southamptonstreet; from thence in a straight line six hundred and twenty-four links along Southampton-street to a point D, opposite the middle of George-street; from thence in a straight line seven hundred and twenty links along Southampton-street to a point E, in the middle of Southampton-street, opposite the middle of Edmund-street; from thence in a straight line along and through the middle of the south end of Edmund-street one thousand two hundred and ten links to a point F, opposite the middle of a street leading from Edmund-street into Southampton-street; from thence in a straight line four hundred and sixty links along and through the middle of the east end of the said street to the middle of Southampton-street at G; from thence along Southampton-street in a straight line eight hundred and fifty links to a point H, in the middle of Southampton-street, opposite the middle of John-street; from thence in a straight line along Southampton-street one thousand two hundred andeighty-six links to a point I, in the middle of the said street; from thence in a-straight line one thousand three hundred links to a point J, in the middle of Southampton-street, opposite the centre of a passage or tootway on the south side of the Rosemary Branch public house, leading to Peckham fields; from thence in a straight line two hundred and fifty links through the middle of the said passage to the point K; from thence in a straight line one thousand and eighty-six links along a lane to the point L; from thence in a straight line along a hedge three hundred and fifty links to the corner of a hedge in Peckham fields at M; from thence in a straight line three thousand one hundred and two links along Peckham fields to the centre of a bridge over the Grand Surrey Canal at N; from thence along the centre of the Grand Surrey Canal seven thousand three hundred and ninety links to the boundary of Camberwell and Deptford parishes at O; from thence in a straight line one thousand four hundred and thirtyfive links along the centre of a ditch which divides the parishes of Camberwell and Deptford to the corner of the parish at P; from thence along the middle of a ditch or sewer, known by the name of Galley Wall Ditch, which separates Camberwell parish from the parishes of Rotherhithe and Bermondsey, eight thousand four hundred and twenty links to the corner of a wall at Q; from thence four hundred and fifty links along the boundary line of Camberwell and Bermondsey parishes, to the extremity of the parish at R; from thence three hundred and seventy links in a straight line to take her to Maracaibo, and that himself and a

along the boundary of the parish, in front of Camherwell-place, to the boundary of the parish in the Kent-road at S; from thence four bundred and thirty-one links in a straight line along the Kent-road, at the boundary of the parishes of Camberwell and Saint George the Martyr, Southwark, to the boundary of the parish at T; from thence along the middle of a ditch or sewer, which separates the parishes of Camberwell and Newington, seven thousand one hundred and fifty links, to the extremity of the parish in the London road at U; from thence in a straight line nice hundred and twenty-four links, along the high road leading from Loudon to Camberwell, over the middle of a sewer which separates the parishes of Camberwell and Newington, to the boundary of the parish at V; from thence one thousand nine hundred and fortysix links, along a ditch which divides the parishes of Camberwell and Newington, to the extremity of the parish at W; from thence one thousand two hundred and sixty-two links, along the boundary line between Camberwell and Lambeth parishes to the point A in Bowyers-lane, where the description of the boundaries commenced, as the same is delineated in the map hereunto annexed and therein coloured red.

Examination of Patrick Smith, late Master of the Sloop Tom Paine, before Robert G. Kirkland and William Robertson, Esqrs. Justices of the Peace in and for the Parish of St. George.

Jamaica Ss.

Patrick Smith, late Master of the sloop Tom-Paine, having been duly sworn, made oath and said; that the sloop Tom Paine was owned by John Campbell, of Montego-Bay, and that he sailed in the said sloop from Kingston, on the 31st day of March 1825, bound to Maracaibo, in the island of Cuba, consigned to a Mr. Hall, Merchant, there; and that off that place they were captured by a Colombian privateer, called the Isabella, of Maracaibo, commanded by John Bedwell, sailing with a Colombian commission; the Prizemaster and three seamen were put on board, with order's

boy only of the former crewwere left on board; that the plea for capture was, that the cargo was Spanish property. And this deponent further said, that from the ignorance of the Prizemaster in navigating the said sloop to her destined port, long detention at sea, and being short of water, the said Prizemaster, after passing the several harbours of Montego-Bay, St. Ann's, Port Maria, and Annotto-Bay, finally brought the vessel into Buff's-Bay to get a supply thereof; and the reason for passing the aforesaid harbours, was his fear of detention by our vessels or the authorities ashore. The deponent further said, that he had no command over the yessel after the capture, either before or after her anchorage at Buff-Bay on 23d April; the Quartermaster and one scaman having come on -shore for water, deponent jumped overboard and swam on shore; that soon after Robert G. Kirkland and William Robertson, Esqrs. Justices of the Peace, having heard of there being something suspicious in the said sloop's arrival, interrogated the deponent and the said two men; and failing in an attempt to procure the sloop's papers, from the high sea then running, they ordered the said two men into custody for that night.
