Vienna, May 16.

He tath Instant arrived here Count Palfi from Hungary, being fent by the Duke of Lorrain, as we are told, to inform the Emperor of the Condition his advices tell him the Enemy is in, and of the resolution he has taken to advance with the Imperial Army, and to attack fome place before the Grand-Vizier comes into the Field; and Yesterday eight Pieces of Cannon, shooting 36 Pound Bullets, and four great Mortar Pieces, were drawn out of the Arsenal, and sent to the Army. The Palatine of Hungary is, according to the Emperor's Orders, Poiled with the 5000 Hungarians, that were at the General Rendezvous near Presbourg, in the Island Schatz, for its security against the Incursions of the Garison of Newheusel. The Emperor has resolved to Publish a general Pardon in Hungary, with promile of Restitution of Goods and Estate, to all such as do immediately return to their Obedience to his Imperial Majesty, and not only the Hungarians, but likewise the Germans that have deserted the Emperor's Service, and taken part with the Rebels, are by this renewed Offer of the Empepor's Grace and Pardon invited to return to their Duty. In the mean time we hear that Count Teckeley continues the Siege of the Castle of Donowits and according to all probability he will make himfelf Master of it.

Vienna, May 20. The Imperial Army, who had made a Halt for some days near Rash, Decamp:d again the 15th Instant, and is Marched, as we are told, towards Gran, with a delign to attack that place. Count Palfi is dispatched back to the Army, and this Morning parted from hence five-great Boats Laden with Bombs, Grenadoes, Powder, &c. for the use of the Army. The Palatine of Eungary has Orders to March with the Hungarian Troops under his Command, in order to his joyning with those commanded by Major-General Schutz, and the 6000 Polish Horse, under the Command of the Chevalier de Lubomirski, at Trenchin on the Waag; These Troops are to act against Count Teckeley, who it's said is much concerned at the Alliance concluded between the Emperor and the Crown of Poland. The Elector of Bavaria, who is Treated at this Court with all the respect and kindness imaginable, intends to begin his Journey home in two or three days, and to take it by the way of Prague, having a desire to see that place; and with his Electoral Highness will go the Count de Kaunits, as the Emperor's Envoy Extraordina. ry. The 18th Instant Count Lessie arrived here from Germany, (having refigned the Command of the Imperial Troops now in the Empire to Count of the next Month, to shook a Bishop in the Maximilian de Starenberg, Governour of Philips- place of the Deceased.

burg) and to morrow he parts hence for Hungary, the Emperor having given him one of the chief Commands in his Army. Count Lamberg, the Emperor's Envoy to the Electors of Saxon, and Frandenburg, begun his Journey this Morning. The Emperor has named the Count de Thurn to be his Ambassador at the Court of Poland, from whence one is coming in the same quality hither. His Inte-perial Majesty has likewise resolved to send an Ambaffador to the Czars of Moscow. but the Person

is not yet named.

Ratubonne, May 24. The Electoral Colledge Deing much diffatisfied with the Daper we told you in one of our last the Imperial Commissioner had delivered to them in the name of the Colledge of Princes, concerning the difference now dl pending between the two Colledges, he has fince withdrawn the fame. According to our freshest advices from Hungary, the Imperial Army was Encamped near Raab, from whence the Duke of Lorrain intended to Decamp the 15th, and to enter upon some action, he having, as is faid, received advice, That the Grand-Vizier will not yet in a Month or fix Weeks be in the Field with the main B dy of the Turkish Army. The News we had of the great

Ratubonne, May 27. Nothing has passed in the

Dyet worth communicating since our sait, the Deputies of the Electors expecting new Orders from their Masters before they enter upon any thing concerning the Treaty with France, or the point of the publick Security. From Vienna they write, That the Palatine of Hungary is ordered to pass the River Wang, and to joyn General Schutz and the Prince of Lubomirski, who is expected with 6000 Poles, near Trenchin, and that they are to not against the Hungarians, in case they do not accept of the Pardon which the Emperor has now again offered them. The Advices from Hungary say, That Count Teckeley has made himself Master of the Castle of Donowits, after having besieged it five Weeks, and that the Baron Founnel is a Prifoner; and that Count Teckeley had received feveral Summons from the Balla of Offen, to take the Field, and to joyn the Turkish Troops under his Command, but that hitherto he had made several pretences to excuse it.

Cologne, May 28. Things continue here in great disorder, the Commonalty demanding the Execution of what they pretched the Magistrates lately promised them; and these, to preserve the Publick Peace, have appointed Guards in several places of the City. The Bishop of Strasburg is gone for Assace. It is reported here, That the Circle of Suabia is at last entred into the League which the Circles of Bavaria, Franconia, and the Upper Rhine, have lately made with the Emperor.
